Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE THE REPORT FROM THE **ELECTION COMMITTEE.** Seconded by Director Joaquin Baca. The **MOTION CARRIED** UNANIMOUSLY.

b. Discussion/Approval of Polling Locations - Eli Lovato, Election Director

Mr. Lovato stated there were two polling locations in question. He thanked Director Sandoval that they received approval to use the Sandia Pueblo Senior Mill Site. The other was the Agri-Nature Center in Los Ranchos, which they're still waiting for a response. He said they did receive an email from Chief Leo Perez accommodating the fire headquarters on 2nd Street, which is one mile from the boy scout building.

The Chair questioned whether to table the item as the sites weren't finalized but Ms. Wiggins stated the board can take action knowing that there may be an alternative site. She said if you approve the first and second choices, then it would be a matter of reporting at the next meeting the final group of polling places.

Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE THE POLLING LOCATIONS WITH UNDERSTANDING THAT THE FIRST AND SECOND CHOICES ARE ALSO APPROVED FOR THE BOARD. Seconded by Vice Chair Dunning. The MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

c. Discussion/Approval for Resolution BD-07-10-23-55, Regarding Election Signage

Vice Chair Dunning stated earlier that it's too hard to police the little signs and they would prohibit large signs. She recommended the District needed to have a temporary signage policy put in place at some point. The reason behind the resolutions is the MRGCD has many rules about getting a license but nothing about a temporary signage policy. She wanted to explain

that when there's a sign placed on MRGCD property it doesn't mean that MRGCD is promoting a candidacy.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 5 - REPORT FROM MRGCD GENERAL COUNSEL - Lorna M. Wiggins

Ms. Wiggins explained the MRGCD was forced to seek a temporary restraining order from Judge Erin O'Connell as a result of Adriana Villar's effort to alter, modify, and damage the portions of the Rogers Lateral on the western boundaries of her property. The court granted full relief sought by the MRGCD and were granted access to all portions of Ms. Villar's property. Ms. Wiggins stated MRGCD was required to rebuild and recreate the damaged part of the Rogers Lateral but was met with impediments, interference and troubling behavior by Ms. Villar when trying to do so. She stated they then had to go back to court for assistance. Ms. Wiggins thanked and acknowledged the personnel who were on site under difficult circumstances. They had to have Bernalillo County Sheriff's deputies on site for the first several times, for the full number of hours the crew was present and periodically to conduct well checks as needed.

Vice Chair Dunning thanked everyone for their bravery and asked if people on the Rogers Lateral had received water yet. Ms. Wiggins stated they had not but were able to staff crews with resources to maybe salvage some of the irrigation season for them.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 6 - ITEMS FROM THE FLOOR (Comments are limited to six (6) minutes)

Martin Haynes

Mr. Haynes thanked the Board for allowing him to attend the tour of MRGCD and EBID (Elephant Butte Irrigation District). He said the biggest takeaway he took from the trip w

Ms. Gallegos, a water user for about 50 years, thanked all the people that had been going out and working on the Rogers Lateral. She stated she had fruit trees that were hard to water with city water, which ran her bill high.

Georgina Serna-Pacheco

Ms. Serna-Pacheco stated she lived next door to Ms. Villar, who caused damage, time, money, and headaches to the people who were trying to fix the ditch. She said she was concerned if irrigation would open up and if they would get flooded. She thanked everyone that helped with the effort and hoped things would get resolved and calmed down.

Mark Garcia

Mr. Garcia thanked Martin Haynes for coming out. He asked who decides when a habitat becomes a habitat and why. He said it was very concerning. Mr. Casuga stated they would answer that question in writing.

142 Eddie Baca

Mr. Baca thanked everyone who helped with the Rogers Lateral. He also thanked Ms. Lorna Wiggins for her help.

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Santiago Maestas

Mr. Maestas thanked everyone at the MRGCD for the work they did to restore the acequia. He said the commission filed criminal charges against Ms. Villar for interfering with the acequia and denying the commission's access to the easement. He said Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department was conducting an investigation to be able to testify in the case against her.

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Reyna Banteah

Ms. Banteah, an irrigator and farmer along the Rogers Lateral, showed appreciation to MRGCD for all the work they had been doing.

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Angelina Lopez-Brody

Ms. Lopez-Brody, a neighbor of the damaged property off the Rogers Lateral, thanked the Conservancy District for stepping up and helping. She highlighted a ditch rider, Anderson (Tolth). She said he was an excellent resource. She also mentioned they may see her in the future as a collaborator, as she worked for American Friends Service Committee.


AGENDA ITEM NO. 8 - UPDATE ON THE 2023 IRRIGATION SEASON


a. Report on the Water Supply Conditions - Anne Marken, Water Ops Division Manager


Ms. Marken stated they had experienced above average river flows due to the above average snowpack, with inflows to the Middle Valley peaking at 500 cubic feet per second in June, even after Army Corps of Engineers stored water in their upstream reservoirs to prevent flooding of downstream communities. She stated La Puente Gauge was measuring 120 cubic feet per second (CFS) today, which was down from 1000 CFS a month ago. She said Embudo Gauge was 850 CFS, down from 3500 CFS a month ago, and Otowi Bridge Guage was 1100 CFS, down from 4600 CFS a month ago. Ms. Marken said the river was still continuous to Elephant Butte and the middle valley had not seen any river channel drying as of yet. She reminded that the only storage water available to MRGCD was San Juan Chama water this year, with expected full allocation by July 15th. Ms. Marken said there was 14,500 acre feet of water stored for prior and paramount lands for the year. She said New Mexico was carrying 93,000 acre feet of Compact debt at the end of 2022. She stated the two-week outlook showed above average temperatures and near normal chances for precipitation, and much of the same for the outlook through September.

Chair Russo Baca clarified that even though there was storage in Abiquiu, it would not be released during irrigation season.









Status Report on Water Distribution - Matt Martinez, Water Distribution Division Manager

Mr. Martinez stated they had been able to continue meeting irrigation demand. He stated they've seen intermittent shortages in Cochiti Division. It was important that water users communicated their needs to their ISOs in advance and take delivery day and night. He said they were able to offset periods of high use by increasing the Angostura Diversion in Albuquerque Division, and ISOs were closely coordinating to keep the system in balance. Mr. Martinez stated Corrales was maintaining a steady rate of pumping but would need to keep an eye on the river stage there. He said they had strict flow limits on the Belen High Line Canal in the southwestern part of Belen and reiterated to farmers they would be working on short term and long term solutions to establish stability there. He added they started diverting to San Acacia Diversion Dam in Socorro to ensure they were getting enough supply to meet demand as the Unit 7 Drain flows dropped. Mr. Martinez informed the Board that the latest zone assignments would be updated on the website later in the week. He said operations would get tighter in the second half of the irrigation season, as water would not be as readily available as it was in the spring runoff. He reminded that they must be cautious in sensitive areas when rain was forecasted due to the risk of stormwater inflows and their impact on their facilities and operations.

Vice Chair Dunning asked if water would now be rotational or still get water when the crop needed it. Mr. Martinez stated their intent was to give water when the crop needed it and did not plan to go into rotations, but there might be longer wait times.

Mr. Casuga encouraged irrigators and farmers to contact often and get their name on the book, and if they had a hard time doing that, to call the irrigation systems supervisors, Matt (Martinez) or himself.

Vice Chair Dunning also asked how things were looking for Corrales. Mr. Martinez stated it was business per usual now. He reported that they are pumping at a healthy rate and was to be determined.

Dr. DuMars asked if there was any anticipation of drying of the river. Mr. Casuga stated that they did expect the river to dry south of San Acacia within the next two weeks, and they would start over-diverting to control that drying and assist with salvage operations. He said they probably would have some drying of Isleta also, but not the whole reach.

Dr. DuMars also stated he and Jason (Casuga) had a good discussion about the Belen High Line and discussed a number of options. He said the Belen High Line was untenable when they had flooding and overtopped the canal, so they needed to figure out how to fix that in maybe some public/private partnerships.

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
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AGENDA ITEM NO. 9 - PRESENTATION OF THESIS: HABITAT SUITABILITY AT THE LOS **CHAVEZ OUTFALL - Haley Ormsbee, Engineering Intern**

Ms. Ormsbee discussed her thesis for UNM that was on hydraulic habitat suitability for the silvery minnow at the Los Chavez outfall. She stated she wanted to answer how different Rio Grande and outfall discharges affected habitat availability for the minnow at Los Chavez, with the overall goal of helping water managers at the District close the knowledge gap concerning the effects of irrigation outfalls on minnow habitat availability. She stated typically 3 to 5 CFS was released from the outfall when the Rio Grande dropped below 100 CFS. She said the methods she used were building a hydraulic model, forming a conceptual hydraulic model, and combining the results of those models into maps and eco-value curves. She said the most useful outputs of the research were the eco-value curves for larval and adult habitat, with results showing that for both larval and adult minnows, the more water was released from the outfall, the weighted usable areas increased, but there was a diminishing return in available habitat as more water was released from the outfall because minnows prefer shallow depths in near zero velocities. She stated overall adult minnows had more usable area than larval minnows. Ms. Ormsbee concluded that available area was not impacted until the Rio Grande started to inundate the sandbar at 1000 CFS, and the area-discharged relationships could help the District figure out which flows to target for both larval and adult minnows. She stated the results from the maps showed little suitability for larval minnows, with adult minnows having suitable conditions for each simulated flow, but the portion that flowed through the bosque became less suitable as more flows were released.





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
Habitat Suitability Indices (HSIs)

Hydraulic-Habitat Suitability Indices (H-HSIs)


- Velocity and depth HSI's are multiplied together to create a composite Hydraulic-Habitat Suitability Index (H-HSI)

- · "Bins" are used to separate H-HSIs into four breaks for visualization




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
Weighted Usable Area (WUA)

AGENDA ITEM NO. 10 - REPORT(S) FROM THE OF THE INTERIOR -

a. Bureau of Reclamation - Jennifer Faler, Area Manager

Ms. Faler stated the Corps of Engineers got caught with a bunch of water in Abiquiu and Cochiti they could not move down per Compact restrictions. She said she thought they could all come together to find solutions for moving that water as efficiently as possible. She said BOR was learning about how the river was behaving and could put that to good use. She stated they would find a way to move the floodwaters most efficiently and hopefully had P&P water to move as well. Ms. Faler stated their infrastructure was being put to the test in both San Juan Chama Project and El Vado. She said the high volumes water were causing debris to clog up the intakes at the San Juan Chama Project, and the reservoir level was low in El Vado because of the ongoing construction, causing tumbleweeds and sediment to clog up the intake structure. She said they had a team trying to figure out what to do, with one option being filling up the reservoir and doing a burp, which opens up the gates to try to shoot air up to break up the debris. Ms. Faler said it was time to clarify ownership at El Vado and had conversations with the state engineer about it, suggesting joining MRGCD and figure out how to get it done.

Mr. Casuga stated it would be a good idea to draft a memo of why that would be a good idea to consider whose action it would become to store water, and that if they owned permit 1690 it

would become their action to be presented to the Board. He stated it was creating challenges that did not need to be there.

Ms. Faler stated BOR did not consider middle Rio Grande their project water, explaining that they stored the water, but once it's released, it became the ownership of whoever they released it for. She said they were having internal discussions on kicking off phase two of the title transfer. She spoke about a project they tried to do almost 30 years ago that went all the way through the EIS process and was not implementable due to not enough money and support from the state and the District at the time, but now was the time to get projects done with the good relationships they have now with the District and the State.

Director Duggins asked if they had a percentage to compare trees that the natural habitat in the bosque used compared to the Ag community. Ms. Faler said they received comments on the EIS to do a Lower San Acacia Reach water update because it was out of date, and it said 38% was consumed by natural vegetation of the bosque and 30% of the water Ag.

Director Duggins also asked if the second round of title transfer would include the Low Flow. Mr. Casuga answered he did not think it would have it because they would not be operating and maintaining it long enough. Ms. Faler responded they were not allowed to transfer reserved works, which is when they did the maintenance under the first phase.

Ms. Faler acknowledged the District for having the vision to realize filling the gap between the middle Rio Grande project and the Rio Grande project was probably a wise thing to do and was enough notice to bring out leadership from D.C.

a. Review of End of Fiscal Year 2023 and Fourth Quarter Financials

present the final year in financial statements once the auditors had a chance to review the numbers. She said the District budgeted a deficit of 2.1 million in FY23. She stated that did change the budgetary method and added encumbrances that were normally recorded as expenses of 1.8 million, which changed the budget deficit to 4 million for FY23. Ms. Fanelli informed the Board they were at 3.5 million dollars deficit with almost 3 million in encumbrances that would roll to next period and included in the deficit. She said actual revenues excluding other financing sources totaled \$28,110,000, but confident ad valorem would meet or exceed the budgeted total of 21.6 million. She noted that the revenue year to date through May totaled \$636,000 compared to \$41,000 in FY22, and an unrealized gain on investments totaling \$246,000. She stated expenditures excluding transfers total 29 million, compared to 24.7 million in FY22, mainly due to increased salaries and benefits, increased vehicles and equipment operations, maintenance, constructions, and rehab, and project expenditures, with an increase in capital equipment expenditures of almost 1.2 million. Ms. Fanelli said cash balances excluding what's held for Socorro Water Trust Board, totaled 26.5

Ms. Fanelli stated the District presented the fourth quarter budget for FY23. She said they would

million.

b. Report on the Finance Committee Meeting, July 7, 2023 - Directors Kelly, Dunning, and Barbara Baca

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Vice Chair Dunning stated they were required by DFA (Department of Finance and Administration) to pass a year end resolution and they do it every quarter. She said revenues were up and deficit was pretty scary, stating water pushing up against the levees required \$700,000 in repairs. She stated the real takeaway from the meeting was that they needed to increase the mill levy and the committee recommended approval of the numbers.

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Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE THE REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. Seconded by Director Sandoval. The MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

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c. Approval of Resolution BA-07-10-23-91 for the Fiscal Year 2023 Fourth Quarter Unaudited Financial Report and Unaudited Cash Balance Review as of July 1, 2023

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Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE THE REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. Seconded by Vice Chair Dunning. The MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

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d. Discussion/Approval for Resolution M-07-10-23-199 for Authorizing Acceptance of Water Trust Board Project No. WPF-5970 Funding Offer; Water Storage, Conveyance and Delivery Project; Corrales Siphon Replacement from the NM **Finance Authority**

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Ms. Fanelli stated the resolution was asking for approval to accept the Water Trust Board grant/loan funding offer for the Corrales Siphon Replacement, which consisted of a grant of \$6,372,000, loan amount of \$708,000, and District match requirement of 1.4 million, which has been budgeted in fiscal year 2024.

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Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION M-07-10-23-199. Seconded by Vice Chair Dunning. The MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

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e. Discussion/Approval for Resolution M-07-10-23-200 for the Adoption of the 2024-2028 Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan (ICIP)

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Ms. Fanelli stated this resolution was the ICIP plan due to the state of New Mexico on July 14th. She said the Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) was developed by taking the prior year's ICIP and merging it with the District's long term infrastructure plan, and then presented with the mill rate request increase and FY24 budget.

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Chair Russo Baca made the MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION M-07-10-23-200. Seconded by Vice Chair Dunning. The MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

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AGENDA ITEM NO. 12 - REPORT(S) FROM THE CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER - Eric Zamora, PE

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a. Report on the MRGCD Division Offices - Eric Zamora, COO

Mr. Zamora said they had been doing levee operations and repairs for the last two months. He stated Cochiti maintenance was ongoing and people stepped up to do what needed to be done. He said the Sile Main right of way was the most significant issue Cochiti was facing. He mentioned Cochiti Feast was coming up Friday and invited everyone to attend. He said Albuquerque maintenance was ongoing and Albuquerque Division had been helping out with some levee repairs in Valencia County. He said the first round of mowing was almost complete. He stated the runoff had been great but high amounts of sediment were requiring a full-time effort for two big pieces of equipment, which is the High Line Canal and the Peralta Main. He also spoke about the Rogers Lateral and showed pictures. Mr. Zamora said maintenance was ongoing in Belen Division and was getting back to routine. He said they had a new division manager who was bringing a metrics based approach to management and would be a learning curve for the way they did business. He said the four division manager in place now were very communicative and receptive to feedback, criticism, and input. He said spraying and mowing were top priorities in Belen. He said all supervisor positions were filled and had interviews scheduled for field maintenance technician. Mr. Zamora gave an update on NMDOT Highway 6 repairs. He said they were happy they are looking at reinforced concrete pipes in a larger size, which is more costly but the right solution. He said the Socorro Division was moving right along with a good routine, experience, knowledgeable management and staff. He stated maintenance was ongoing and mowing was on the second round. He said key issues going in the monsoon season were the arroyos that intersect their facilities, in which all intersection points had been prepped, culverts cleaned, and grading done to accommodate arroyo flows.

Mr. Zamora then spoke about ER&T (Equipment Repair & Transportation) and the new budget. He said they were looking to get requisitions for the new equipment. He said they currently had 61 pending license requests in the Lands and Licensing Department. He said the requests were assigned to the three different staff members and they split them up and start doing reviews, analysis, and what impacts those licenses would have on District operations. He stated that 17 were in final stages of review. He also announced they had a candidate in the vacant right of way manager posting.

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AGENDA ITEM NO. 13 - REPORT(S) FROM THE CHIEF ENGINEER - Jason M. Casuga, PE

447 a. Consideration/Approval of the Renewal of the MOA Between MRGCD and the Rio 448 Grande Water Fund, March 14, 2023 - Steven Bassett and Matthew Piccarello, The 449 Nature Conservancy and Casey Ish, Conservation Program Supervisor

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Mr. Piccarello stated their watersheds deserved the same kind of investment, emphasis, and focus on treatment. He said they had some deferred maintenance on infrastructure in the watershed and that was what the Rio Grande Water Fund was working on. He said the Los Conchas Wildfire in 2011 was the catalyst for the water fund and a big wakeup call of what

could happen if they had a catastrophic fire in the Rio Grande Watershed. Mr. Piccarello stated the Water Fund was investing in restoration of forested lands upstream so they could secure pure fresh water, and the goal was to generate sustainable funding over the next 20 years to increase the pace and scale of the forest restoration. He said the San Juan Chama Project Source Watersheds were a big emphasis for them. He stated they were trying to avoid what happened to Cochiti Reservoir. Mr. Piccarello emphasized it was not impossible to treat in wilderness areas, but not in a short timeframe. He pointed out that the Navajo River Basin was predominantly private land and basically one landowner, so it was one of the easier places to work. He talked about funding for forest restoration and wildfire risk reduction and how partnerships came in handy when it came to that.

Mr. Casuga added that the District had a great relationship with the Nature Conservancy and Rio Grande Water Fund and were proposing to increase the amount and that investment in this work was needed. He presented a MOA asking for the Board's approval.

Director Duggins asked what was causing the fires. Mr. Piccarello said it was a number of factors, including climate change, human caused fires, power lines, fireworks, etc.

Vice Chair Dunning made the **MOTION TO APPROVE MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT.** Seconded by Director Sandoval. The **MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.**

b. Report on the Joint Rio Grande Tour - MRGCD/Elephant Butte Irrigation District (EBID), June 27-29, 2023 - Jason M. Casuga, CE/CEO and Chair Russo Baca


Mr. Casuga said they had representation from every agency including senior staffers from federal delegations on different sections of the tour. He stated one of the biggest impacts they could make is in the bureaucracy of the federal government, and they've invested in doing that. He said MRGCD had every interest to do this well and they've done a good job because they had reason to and had a need. He emphasized that they needed to comply with the biological opinion to do the job of benefitting water. Mr. Casuga said MRGCD and EBID needed to work together.

Mr. Casuga said they gave a water update about changing conditions, and there were questions about water operations that Ms. Marken was there to answer. He said there were also maintenance questions, and Mr. Zamora would be working to get answers to the coalition on that. He said Ms. Faler provided a report to them, and the Six Middle Rio Grande Coalition Pueblo would like the idea that the permit was in federal government's hands, but water would be there for the benefit of the middle valley, including the new reclaimed lands.

Mr. Casuga stated the signing ceremony was to get the design agreement for the Bernalillo to Belen Flood Control Project in. He said there was a lot of energy with Valencia County on seeking some state funding. He said the biggest issue they had was getting it to line up with the Corps, so they don't have money sit.

Wilson & Company has prepared a Task Order for the above referenced project. The Task Order will provide professional services for the design of the Corrales Siphon based on the selected HDD option from the Corrales Main Siphon Alternatives Analysis. The intent of the Task order is to prepare plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the existing Siphon located at the Corrales Main and Rio Grande River. The scope of the services will include:

Task 1 Coordination and Project Management

Coordination will take place with MRGCD and others as needed for the design and approval for the project. This will include site visits, phone calls and in persons meetings as needed.

Task 2 Design

Design of the project will be based on the selected HDD option. Elements of the design will include the following items:

- Cover Sheet
- General Notes
- Horizontal Control
- Typical Sections
- Grading Plan
- Siphon Plan and Profiles
- Structure Details
- Cost Estimate
- Construction Specifications

Design submittals will be made at 30%, 60%, 90% and 100% for review and comment by MRGCD.

Task 3 Design Analysis Report (DAR)

A Design Analysis Report will be generated that documents the process and calculations for the design of the project. A written narrative along will all backup calculations will be submitted for review and comment. Comments will be address and a final report will be submitted.

Task 4 Environmental

Recently BIA has been requiring short Environmental Assessments (rather than CEs) for ROW approvals. BIA review of documents will require 2 sets of minor revisions. BIA will coordinate its required SHPO/THPO consultation for cultural resources. A biological survey is also required to support the NEPA documentation. It is assumed that no formal consultation w/the U.S. Fish and



Wildlife Service will be required (informal consultation and cooperation can be managed by MRGCD staff to ensure consistency w/the 2016 Biological Opinion issued by the Service). A cultural survey assumes there will be 4-6 cultural & historical sites whose documentation needs to be updated. It is assumed no Clean Water Act 404 Nationwide or individual permit will be required – i.e., no dredge or fill activity will be occurring in the Rio Grande or any adjacent wetlands.

Task 5 Survey

Our surveying/mapping approach is to use our sUAS (drone) to map the project limits. Our field survey will consist of locating the siphon and piping that is visible. We will also locate any visible utilities and obscure areas that would not be visible with the sUAS. Control will be based on NAD 83, New Mexico Central Zone, NAVD 88 and will be scaled to ground around (0,0). Our team will set 10 aerial targets and collect 14 check shots for the sUAS flight. The final deliverable will be a Civil 3D drawing along with a PDF of the mapping and location of the orthophoto. A level A SUE will be performed to determine the location of the existing gas line along the river.

1.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Based on information provided by Tyler Ashley, PE, PMP, CFM, on January 3, 2023. the proposed project is an irrigation siphon to be installed under the Rio Grande River. We understand that the bottom elevation of the siphon will be 4980 feet. Should any of our information or assumptions not be correct, the Client should notify WT.

2.0 PURPOSE

The purpose of our geotechnical engineering services will be to evaluate the subsurface conditions to provide recommendations and/or discussion for the following:

- Subsurface conditions
- Foundation design parameters for pipe installation, including allowable bearing capacities, and estimated settlements.
- Lateral earth pressures
- Earthwork, including site preparation, fill placement, bedding and backfill, and suitability of existing soils for fill materials.
- Drainage
- Seismic considerations
- Excavation conditions
- Corrosivity





3.0 SCOPE OF SERVICES

3.1 Field Exploration

We will conduct the following subsurface exploration program that is based on the project description and our knowledge of the general soil conditions in the area:

Siphon Alignment - 6 test borings to depths of 80 feet below the existing site grades.

All explorations will be advanced to the depths outlined unless refusal to auger drilling is encountered. A field engineer/geologist will log the borings, record blow counts of penetration tests, and obtain undisturbed and representative samples of soils encountered as conditions dictate.

3.2 <u>Laboratory Testing</u>

A geotechnical engineer will examine the samples and field logs and assign the laboratory tests. The following laboratory tests may be performed:

- A scaled site plan will be supplied by the Client CAD file preferred

- The proposed borings will be used for geotechnical exploration and sampling only. No environmental information or data will be gathered or generated

We will contact *New Mexico 811* prior to mobilizing to the site. This service marks only the primary utility lines in the roadway and dedicated utility easements and usually does not locate tributary lateral lines on private property. - **7.1** All work papers (including reports, field notes, laboratory notes, laboratory test data, calculations and other documents prepared by WT), electronic data files and other work product generated by or for WT in connection with the Scope of Work are the property of WT. Samples obtained shall remain the property of Client.
- **7.2** Client has the right to use the reports, recommendations, design criteria and similar information submitted to it by WT, provided that Client pays WT's invoices. Client expressly agrees that no information produced or provided by WT shall be used for or at any location or for any project or project extension that is not expressly set forth in this Agreement without WT's prior written permission.
- **7.3** Client will indemnify, defend, and hold WT harmless for and from the use of and any reliance upon any part of said electronic data and/or anything generated from Client that has been modified or altered in any way. The controlling document regarding any document prepared by WT shall remain and always be the signed report originally provided to Client and maintained on file by WT.
- **7.4** Client shall not assign this Agreement, any of WT's reporting or work product, or any legal or equitable claim involving WT, without the prior express written consent of WT. Any purported assignment without the prior express written consent of WT shall be null and void.

8. TERMINATION

In addition to termination otherwise authorized by law and equity, this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon providing written notice of termination.

9. WT NOT BOUND

WT shall not be bound by: any provision incorporating by reference any contract or term of any contract unless the term or terms incorporated by reference are specifically furnished to WT and are expressly agreed to in a writing signed by WT; any provision or agreement providing for or imposing liquidated damages however described or denominated; any provision waiving any right to a mechanic's lien; any provision conditioning payment for WT's services upon payment to Client by any third party; any provision requiring the application of law or jurisdiction other than that which applies to the place of the project; any provision permitting Client to take possession of any property of WT; or any provision requiring mediation or arbitration of any claim or dispute.

10. FEES AND COSTS

In the event of any claim or litigation arising out of the work, including the Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of its attorneys' fees, consultants' fees, and costs.

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AGREEMENT BETWEEN

the

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR BUREAU OF RECLAMATION. the MIDDLE RIO GRANDE CONSERVANCY DISTRICT

and the

ALBUQUERQUE BERNALILLO COUNTY WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY TO EXCHANGE SAN JUAN-CHAMA PROJECT WATER STORED IN ABIQUIU RESERVOIR FOR AN EQUAL AMOUNT STORED IN HERON RESERVOIR

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made this 20th day of July, 2023, between the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, hereafter styled the United States, acting through the Secretary of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation ("Reclamation or Contracting Officer"), acting pursuant to the Act of June 17, 1902 (ch. 1093, 32 Stat. 388) and Acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, particularly the authority granted the Secretary under Section 14 of the Reclamation Project Act of August 4, 1939 (ch.418, 53 Stat. 1197; 43 U.S.C. § 389), and the Act of June 13, 1962 (76 Stat. 96), and the MIDDLE RIO GRANDE CONSERVANCY DISTRICT, a body corporate and political division of the State of New Mexico, ("MRGCD"); and the ALBUQUERQUE BERNALILLO COUNTY WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY, a political subdivision of the State of New Mexico, ("Water Authority") (each Reclamation, MRGCD, and the Water Authority are a "Party" and together they are the "Parties").

EXPLANATORY RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Colorado River Storage Project was authorized by the Act of April 11, 1956 (70 Stat. 105), as amended and supplemented by, among other statutes, the Act of June 13, 1962 (76 Stat. 96), which authorized the San Juan-Chama Project (SJCP) as a participating project in the Colorado River Storage Project; and

WHEREAS, Congress authorized the Secretary of the Army in the Act of December 29, 1981 (P.L. 97-140, 95 Stat. 1717) to store up to 200,000 AF of SJCP water in Abiquiu Reservoir; and

WHEREAS, The Water Authority has the right under Contract No. DACW47-86-C-0009 dated March 20, 1986, with USACE to store up to 170,900 AF of SJCP water in Abiquiu Reservoir and to facilitate that SJCP water storage, the Water Authority has acquired fee simple property and easements from private landholders surrounding Abiquiu Reservoir up to Elevation 6,230 feet; and

WHEREAS, as of July 17, 2023, Reclamation has under lease 15,664 acre-feet of SJCP water stored in Heron for supplemental water to be released to support the endangered Rio Grande Silvery Minnow, with 10,000 acre-feet of the 15,664 acre-feet available for exchange under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, as of July 17, 2023, MRGCD received its respective total 2023 SJCP water allocation from Heron Reservoir in the amount of 20,900 acre-feet. This 20,900 acre-feet of water is also available for exchange under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the total combined available delivery to MRGCD and Reclamation available for exchange at Heron Reservoir in 2023 is referred to as the "2023 Heron Delivery"; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet their respective obligations downstream, Reclamation and MRGCD must convey their respective portions of the 2023 Heron Delivery through a series of connected reservoirs including first, the El Vado Reservoir located immediately south of the Heron Reservoir, and second the Abiquiu Reservoir located immediately south of the El Vado Reservoir; and

WHEREAS, Reclamation has separately commenced Safety of Dams (SOD) Corrective Action construction on El Vado Dam and, owing to this construction or other factors, the release of the 2023 Heron Delivery through El Vado in the quantities required by Reclamation and MRGCD is presently infeasible; and

WHEREAS, Reclamation and MRGCD therefore seek to exchange water stored by the Water Authority at Abiquiu Reservoir for more immediate downstream use by Reclamation and/or MRGCD in order to more fully meet their respective needs and obligations during the 2023 irrigation season while releases through El Vado remain infeasible.

AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, in consideration of mutual covenants and agreements set forth herein, and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Exchange. As described in detail in Articles 2 and 3 below, the Water Authority currently has sufficient SJCP water stored in Abiquiu Reservoir beyond that required to meet its immediate obligations that it will exchange with Reclamation and MRGCD in an amount up to, but not exceeding, Reclamation and MRGCD's 2023 Heron Delivery. In consideration of this exchange, Reclamation and MRGCD will transfer ownership of the 2023 Heron Delivery in an amount equal to that exchanged with the Water Authority.
- 2. Requests for Releases from Abiquiu Reservoir. Upon request by Reclamation and/or MRGCD the Water Authority will allow the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers ("USACE") to release from Abiquiu Reservoir a portion of the Water Authority's stored SJCP water up to the respective amounts of Reclamation's and MRGCD's 2023 Heron Delivery in existence at the time of such request.
- a. Requests for release of the Water Authority's stored SJCP water by Reclamation or MRGCD to the USACE will be documented in the form of an email with copy to the Water Authority's Water Rights Program Manager: Diane Agnew, dagnew@abcwua.org.

- b. Such release requests must also include the total amount of water requested to be released by either Reclamation or MRGCD to dateand be accompanied by verification of the existence of the equivalent amount of the 2023 Heron Delivery not already exchanged under this Agreement.
- c. Reclamation and MRGCD shall provide the Water Authority and USACE with all information necessary for the management of releases of the Water Authority's SJCP water from storage in Abiquiu Reservoir.
- d. Reclamation and MRGCD shall be responsible for all submissions, permits, or approvals that may be necessary to facilitate the Water Authority's releases of water under this Agreement.
- 3. Exchange of Rights. The Water Authority hereby transfers to Reclamation and MRGCD, respectively, its rights in the total amount released by USACE pursuant Article 2, above at the time of release. The MRGCD and Reclamation hereby reciprocally transfer ownership to the Water Authority of their respective portions of the 2023 Heron Delivery in an amount equal to that released by the Water Authority.
- a. The total amount exchanged between the Water Authority and Reclamation is limited to Reclamation's 10,000 acre-feet of the 2023 Heron Delivery.
- b. The total amount exchanged between the Water Authority and MRGCD is limited to MRGCD's 20,900 acre-feet of the 2023 Heron Delivery.
- c. The release requests submitted by Reclamation and/or MRGCD pursuant to Article 2 above, together with the USACE records of its releases occasioned pursuant to those requests establish the quantity of the rights to the 2023 Heron Delivery transferred to the Water Authority pursuant to this Agreement. Reclamation will not release any water accounted for by these rights to or for any Party or person except the Water Authority.
- 4. <u>Water Accounting of Exchange.</u> In coordination with the Water Authority, Reclamation shall cause the total amount of the 2023 Heron Delivery exchanged to the Water Authority by operation of Article 2 above, to be transferred daily from either MRGCD's account or the accounts under lease by Reclamation to the Water Authority's accounts in Heron Reservoir. The Water Authority will request delivery of the exchanged water utilizing the Water Authority's normal processes for obtaining SJCP allocations from Heron Reservoir.

5. Separate Agreements.

a. <u>Waiver Extension by Reclamation.</u> Reclamation will, by separate instrument, extend a waiver to permit the Water Authority to continue its storage of the 2022 SJCP water it acquires from this Agreement in Heron Reservoir until December 31, 2023, or such other date as agreed upon in the waiver extension. Such date may be later than December 31, 2023 if for any reason it is not feasible for Reclamation to convey the total amount of the Water Authority's water to Abiquiu Reservoir by this date.

- b. Water Debt of the MRGCD to the Water Authority. The Water Authority has loaned or provided water to MRGCD on numerous prior occasions, and based on the Water Authority's records, MRGCD separately owes and is obligated to pay the Water Authority an outstanding present balance of 35,000 acre-feet. Nothing in this Agreement affects the MRGCD's obligations or the Water Authority's rights as it relates to this separate debt. MRGCD and the Water Authority will work to identify mutually acceptable terms for repayment of this debt through separate agreement, but neither MRGCD nor the Water Authority otherwise abandon any of their respective rights, remedies, or defenses as it relates to this separate debt. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any amount up to 5,000 acre-feet of the MRGCD's 2023 Heron Delivery not exchanged to the Water Authority under this Agreement will be transferred to the Water Authority as a credit toward MRGCD's debt.
- c. <u>Existing Storage Agreement with USACE</u>. Nothing in this Agreement revises or amends any existing storage agreement between USACE and the Water Authority for storage of its water at Abiquiu Reservoir. Reclamation and MRGCD will manage release requests in a manner that allows for the Water Authority to maximize the available storage space for the needs of the Parties.
- d. <u>No Effect on Prior Agreements or Contracts with Reclamation.</u> This Agreement in no way amends, modifies or supersedes any other agreements between Reclamation and MRGCD or Reclamation and the Water Authority.
- 6. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement terminates on December 31, 2023, unless sooner terminated or extended by mutual written agreement of the Parties.
- 7. Correspondence.
- a. Any correspondence to the Water Authority should be directed to:

- d. The above addresses may be changed by written notice to the other Parties.
- e. Notices sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, shall be deemed delivered on the date stated on the certified mail return receipt. Notices sent by regular first-class mail shall be deemed delivered on the date of delivery by the postal carrier. Notices sent by overnight delivery using a nationally recognized overnight courier shall be deemed delivered upon confirmation from such courier. Notices sent by personal delivery to a responsible person with written confirmation of such delivery shall be deemed delivered upon the date stated.
- 8. <u>No Nullification.</u> No Party may, by termination of this Agreement, nullify obligations already incurred before the date such notice of desire for termination is received, nor prior to the effective date of agreed termination.

9. Waiver of Breach - Not Relieving.

- a. A breach of any provision by any Party to this Agreement does not relieve any other Party of the remaining obligations of this Agreement.
- b. Waiver of any breach of this Agreement by any Party does not constitute a continuing waiver or a waiver of any breach of the same or another provision of this Agreement.
- 10. <u>National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)</u>. NEPA compliance for this Agreement action is satisfied by the "2021 Long Term Supplement to the 2001 Rio Grande Supplemental Water Programmatic Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact" dated June 2021.
- 11. <u>Water Rights Protection.</u> No Party hereto shall assert that any activity under this Agreement shall affect the validity of any existing water rights or rights to water held by any other Party.
- 12. <u>Assignment Limited Successors and Assigns Obligated.</u> This Agreement applies to and binds the successors and assigns of the Parties hereto, but no assignment or transfer of this Agreement or any right or interest therein by either Party is valid until approved in writing by all Parties.
- 13. <u>Contingent on Appropriation or Allotment of Funds.</u> The expenditure or advance of any money or the performance of any obligation of the United States under this Agreement shall be contingent upon appropriation or allotment of funds. Absence of appropriation or allotment of

funds shall not relieve any Party from any obligations under this Agreement. No liability shall accrue to the United States in case funds are not appropriated or allotted.

- 14. Officials not to Benefit. No Member of or Delegate to the Congress, Resident Commissioner, or official of the Water Authority or MRGCD (collectively the "Contractor") shall benefit from this Agreement other than as a water user or landowner in the same manner as other water users or landowners.
- 15. <u>Water Conservation.</u> Prior to the delivery of water provided from or conveyed through federally constructed or federally financed facilities pursuant to this contract, the Contractor shall develop a water conservation plan, as required by subsection 210(b) of the Reclamation Reform Act of 1982 and 43 C.F.R. 427.1 (Water Conservation Rules and Regulations).
- 16. <u>Equal Employment Opportunity.</u> During the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor agree as follows:
- a. The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The Contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the Contracting Officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- b. The Contractor will, in all solicitations or advancements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.
- c. The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.
- d. The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice,

to be provided by the agency Contracting Officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

- e. The Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order No. 11246 of Sept. 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- f. The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the Contracting Agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- g. In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this Agreement or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in part, and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order No. 11246 of Sept. 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- h. The Contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by the rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: *Provided, however*, that in the event the Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction, the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

17. Compliance with Civil Rights Laws and Regulations.

- a. The Contractor shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Pub. L. 88-352; 42 U.S.C. § 2000d), the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-112, Title V, as amended; 29 U.S.C. § 791, et seq.), the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (Pub. L. 94-135, Title III; 42 U.S.C. § 6101, et seq.), Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (Pub. L. 101-336; 42 U.S.C. § 12131, et seq.), and any other applicable civil rights laws, and with the applicable implementing regulations and any guidelines imposed by the U.S. Department of the Interior and/or Bureau of Reclamation.
- b. These statutes prohibit any person in the United States from being excluded from participation in, being denied the benefits of, or being otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving financial assistance from the Bureau of Reclamation on

the grounds of race, color, national origin, disability, or age. By executing this Agreement, the Contractor agrees to immediately take any measures necessary to implement this obligation, including permitting officials of the United States to inspect premises, programs, and documents.

- c. The Contractor makes this Agreement in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining any and all Federal grants, loans, contracts, property discounts, or other Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the Contractor by the Bureau of Reclamation, including installment payments after such date on account of arrangements for Federal financial assistance which were approved before such date. The Contractor recognizes and agrees that such Federal assistance will be extended in reliance on the representations and agreements made in this article and that the United States reserves the right to seek judicial enforcement thereof.
- d. Complaints of discrimination against the Contractor shall be investigated by the Contracting Officer's Office of Civil Rights.
- Certification of Nonsegregated Facilities. The Contractor hereby certifies that it does not maintain or provide for its employees any segregated facilities at any of its establishments and that it does not permit its employees to perform their services at any location under its control where segregated facilities are maintained. It certifies further that it will not maintain or provide for its employees any segregated facilities at any of its establishments and that it will not permit its employees to perform their services at any location under its control where segregated facilities are maintained. The Contractor agrees that a breach of this certification is a violation of the Equal Employment Opportunity clause in this Agreement. As used in this certification, the term "segregated facilities" means any waiting rooms, work areas, rest rooms and wash rooms, restaurants and other eating areas, time clocks, locker rooms and other storage or dressing areas, parking lots, drinking fountains, recreation or entertainment areas, transportation, and housing facilities provided for employees which are segregated by explicit directive or are in fact segregated on the basis of race, creed, color, or national origin, because of habit, local custom, disability, or otherwise. The Contractor further agrees that (except where it has obtained identical certifications from proposed contractors for specific time periods) it will obtain identical certifications from proposed contractors prior to the award of contracts exceeding \$10,000 which are not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Employment Opportunity clause; that it will retain such certifications in its files; and that it will forward the following notice to such proposed contractors (except where the proposed contractors have submitted identical certifications for specific time periods):

NOTICE TO PROSPECTIVE CONTRACTORS OF REQUIREMENT FOR CERTIFICATIONS OF NONSEGREGATED FACILITIES

A Certification of Nonsegregated Facilities must be submitted prior to the award of a contract exceeding \$10,000 which is not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Employment Opportunity clause. The certification may be submitted either for each contract or for all contracts during a period (i.e., quarterly, semiannually, or annually). Note: The penalty for making false statements in offers is prescribed in 18 U.S.C. § 1001.

- 19. <u>Books, Records, and Reports.</u> The Contractor shall establish and maintain accounts and other books and records pertaining to administration of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including the Contractor's financial transactions; water supply data; project operation, maintenance, and replacement logs; project land and rights-of-way use agreements; the water users' land-use (crop census), landownership, land-leasing, and water-use data; and other matters that the Contracting Officer may require. Reports shall be furnished to the Contracting Officer in such form and on such date or dates as the Contracting Officer may require. Subject to applicable Federal laws and regulations, each Party to this Agreement shall have the right during office hours to examine and make copies of the other Party's books and records relating to matters covered by this Agreement.
- 20. <u>Confirmation of Contract.</u> Promptly after the execution of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide evidence to the Contracting Officer that, pursuant to the laws of the State of New Mexico, the Contractor is a legally constituted entity, and the contract is lawful, valid, and binding on the Contractor. This Agreement will not be binding on the United States until the Contractor provides evidence to the Contracting Officer's satisfaction. In addition to other forms of evidence to meet the requirements of this Article, the Contractor may provide or Contracting Officer may require a certified copy of a final decree of a court of competent jurisdiction in the State of New Mexico, confirming the proceedings on the part of the Contractor for the authorization of the execution of this Agreement.
- 21. <u>Changes in Contractor's Organization.</u> While this Agreement is in effect, no change may be made in the Contractor's organization, by inclusion or exclusion of lands or by any other changes which may affect the respective rights, obligations, privileges, and duties of either the United States or the Contractor under this Agreement including, but not limited to, dissolution, consolidation, or merger, except upon the Contracting Officer's written consent.
- 22. <u>Protection of Water and Air Quality.</u> The United States does not warrant the quality of the water delivered to the Contractor and is under no obligation to furnish or construct water treatment facilities to maintain or improve the quality of water delivered to the Contractor.
- a. The Contractor will comply with all applicable water and air pollution laws and regulations of the United States and will obtain all required permits or licenses from the appropriate Federal and the State of New Mexico authorities necessary for the delivery of water by the Contractor; and will be responsible for compliance with all Federal and the State of New Mexico water quality standards applicable to surface and subsurface drainage and/or discharges generated through the use of Federal or Contractor facilities or project water provided by the Contractor within its Project Water Service Area.
- b. This article will not affect or alter any legal obligations of the Secretary to provide drainage or other discharge services.
- 23. <u>Notices.</u> Any notice, demand, or request authorized or required by this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, on behalf of the Contractor, when mailed, postage prepaid, or delivered to Reclamation according to subarticle 6(b) and on behalf of the United States, when mailed, postage prepaid, or delivered to the Contractor according to subarticle 6(a). The

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designation of the addressee or the address may be changed by notice given in the same manner as provided in this article for other notices.

Contract Drafting Considerations. This Agreement has been negotiated and reviewed by the parties hereto, each of whom is sophisticated in the matters to which this Agreement pertains. Articles 1 through 24 of this Agreement have been drafted, negotiated, and reviewed by the parties, and no one party shall be considered to have drafted the stated articles.



1. Heron Summary


