SECTION I

INTRODUCTION

BRIEF HISTORY

The Middle Ro Grande Conservancy (MRGCD) is a political subdivision of the State of New Mexico and is governed by New Mexico State Statutes NMSA 1978, Chapter 73. The MRGCD was created by New Mexico Legislators through the Conservancy Act of 1925 and extends from Cochiti Dam to the north boundary of Bosque Del Apache National Wildlife Refuge. The MRGCD employs approximately 229 employees and operates five (5) offices, with the central office located at 1931 Second Street, SW Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The MRGCD encompasses approximately 150 river miles from Cochiti Dam to the north boundary of Bosque Del Apache. The width of the benefited area varies from 1 to 5 miles. The total area is 277,760 acres, with approximately 128,800 acres of irrigable lands, including 28,500 acres of Tribal land. Presently, approximately 53,000 acres are irrigated by MRGCD's facilities.

The MRGCD serves six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos, which include Cochiti, Santo Domingo, San Felipe, Santa Ana, Sandia, and Isleta. The Pueblos participate as qualified electors in MRGCD elections. The primary functions of the MRGCD are to provide flood protection from the Rio Grande via riverside levees, divert, transport, and deliver irrigation water efficiently to the water users, and provide subsurface drainage benefits to the valley by operating and maintaining the drains resulting in a lowering of the water table.

The Board of Directors consists of seven members as follows: 1-member, Sandoval County; 3-members, Bernalillo County; 1-member, Valencia County; 1-member, Socorro County; and 1-member, At-Large. Terms are four years each, with staggered elections on odd-numbered years.

The MRGCD maintains contracts with the Bureau of Reclamation, Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The MRGCD also works very closely with the State of New Mexico, cities, counties, and other agencies within the State.

A. Purpose: of this Request for Proposal

The Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District invites firms and individuals (Offerors) to submit proposals in accordance with the outlines and specifications contained in the Request for Proposal (RFP).

Offerors may submit a proposal for the General Counsel and the Water Counsel RFP. The Evaluation Committee will independently evaluate each proposal.

In responding to this RFP, Offerors are encouraged to provide any additional information they believe is relevant.

The purpose of the RFP is to select a law firm(s) or individual(s) to provide legal services as General Counsel as well as other duties requested by the Board of Directors and the CEO/Chief Engineer. This contract shall be for a term of one year commencing August 1, 2024, and may be extended in increments of one year, but shall not exceed a total term of four (4) years. The MRGCD reserves the right to renew the contract annually or may at any time elect to not extend this Agreement and advertise to procure these services. MRGCD also reserves the right to procure similar services from another source to be used simultaneously with this Contract or any extension thereof.

- B.** The envelope shall be clearly marked "GENERAL COUNSEL PROPOSAL" in the lower left-hand corner. The date and time marked or stamped on the sealed proposal envelope by MRGCD shall be conclusive evidence of the date and time the proposal was received.

- D.** This procurement shall encompass this RFP and Scope of Work. Should any amendment to this RFP be deemed necessary, it will be distributed in writing to all recipients of the original RFP and posted on the MRGCD's website at www.mrgcd.com. If an amendment requires a time extension, the proposal submission date will be changed as part of the written amendment.

E. DEFINITION OF TERMINOLOGY

This section contains definitions and abbreviations that are used throughout this procurement document.

"Close of Business" (COB) means 4:30 PM Mountain Standard or Mountain Daylight Time, whichever is in effect on the date given.

"Contract" means a written agreement for the procurement of items of tangible personal property or services.

"Contractor" means a successful Offeror who enters into a binding contract.

"Determination" means the written documentation of a decision by the Procurement Manager including findings of fact supporting a decision. A determination becomes part of the procurement file.

"Desirable" - The terms "may", "can", "should", "preferably", or "prefers" identify a desirable or discretionary item or factor (as opposed to "mandatory").

"Evaluation Committee" means a body appointed by the Board of Directors of the MRGCD to perform the evaluation of Offeror proposals. This Evaluation Committee may consist of the MRGCD Board of Directors as a whole.

"Finalist" is defined as an Offeror who meets all the mandatory specifications of this Request for Proposals and whose score on evaluation factors is sufficiently high to merit further consideration by the Evaluation Committee.

"Mandatory" - The terms "must", "shall", "will", "is required", or "are required", identify a mandatory item or factor (as opposed to "desirable"). Failure to meet a mandatory item or factor will result in the rejection of the offeror's proposal.

"Offeror" is any person, corporation, or partnership who chooses to submit a proposal.

"Procurement Manager" means the person or designee authorized by the Agency to manage or administer a procurement requiring the evaluation of competitive sealed proposals.

"Responsible Offeror" means an offeror who submits a responsive proposal and who has furnished required information that complies with the proposal.

"Responsive Offer" or "Responsive Proposal" means an offer or proposal that conforms to all the requirements set forth in the request for proposals.

B. Explanation of Events

1. Issue of RFP

This RFP Is being issued on behalf of the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy on the date indicated in the Sequence of Events.

2. Acknowledgement of Receipt

Potential Offerors should hand deliver and return by Email, facsimile, or U.S. Mail the “Acknowledgement of Receipt Form” that accompanies this document, APPENDIX 6, to have their organization placed on the procurement distribution list. The form should be signed by an authorized representative of the organization, dated, and returned to the Procurement Manager by 4:30 pm MDT, Wednesday, May 15th, 2024.

3. Deadline to Submit Written Questions

Any proposal questions must be submitted in writing by Thursday, May 16th, 2024, to the Procurement Manager.

4. Response to Questions

Written responses to submitted questions will be emailed to all potential offerors who have returned their Acknowledgement of Receipt Form as per Section II.B.2

5. Submission of Proposal

- a. **ALL OFFEROR PROPOSALS MUST BE RECEIVED FOR REVIEW AND EVALUATION BY THE PROCUREMENT OFFICER OR HIS DESIGNEE ON OR BEFORE 10:00 A.M. WEDNESDAY, MAY 29, 2024.** Proposals received after this deadline will not be accepted. The date and time will be recorded on each proposal. Proposals must be addressed and delivered to Procurement Manager at the address listed in Section I, Paragraph “C”. Proposals must be sealed and labeled on the outside of the package to clearly indicate that they are in response to the **“GENERAL COUNSEL PROPOSAL.”** Proposals submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.
- b. A public log will be kept of the names of all offeror organizations that submitted proposals. Pursuant to Section 13-1-116 NMSA 1978, the contents of any proposal shall not be disclosed to competing offerors prior to contract award.

6. Proposal Evaluation

The Evaluation Committee will evaluate proposals. This process will take place from May 29-June 12, 2024. During this time, the Evaluation Committee may initiate discussions with offerors who submit responsive or potentially responsive proposals to clarify aspects of the proposals, but proposals may be evaluated without such discussion. Discussions SHALL NOT be initiated by the Offerors.

7. Selection of Finalists

The evaluating committee shall select the Finalists at a to be determined date and those Offerors selected will be invited to participate in the subsequent steps of the procurement.

8. Best and Final Offers From Finalists

Finalists may be asked to submit revisions to their proposals to obtain the best and final offers by a date TBD. Offers received after this deadline will not be accepted and the Offeror’s proposal without amendments shall constitute the final offer for the evaluation. Best and final offers may be clarified and amended at the finalist offeror's oral presentation.

9. Oral Presentation by Finalists - TBD

Finalist offerors may be required to present their proposals to the Evaluation Committee. The Procurement Manager will schedule the time for each Offeror presentation. All Offeror presentations will be held at the MRGCD office in Albuquerque, NM, and oral presentations will be limited to one (1) hour in duration.

10. Board Approval

MRGCD Board will take action for approval and award of the General Counsel on Monday, July 8, 2024. This contract shall be awarded to the offeror whose proposal is most advantageous to the MRGCD, taking into consideration the evaluation factors outlined in the RFP. The MRGCD reserves the right to make multiple awards under this procurement.

11. Notice of Award

The Procurement Officer will notify all finalists in writing of the final award on July 9, 2024.

12. Protest Deadline

Any protest by an Offeror must be timely and in conformance with Section 13-1 172 NMSA 1978 and applicable procurement regulations. The fifteen (15) day protest period for responsive offerors shall begin on the day following the contract award and will end as of 4:30 p.m. Mountain Time on July 23, 2024. Protests must be written and must contain the name and address of the protestant, the name of this solicitation, and a statement of grounds for protest, including appropriate supporting exhibits. Protests received after the deadline will not be accepted.

C. General Requirements

This procurement is being conducted in accordance with the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District and State Procurement Regulations.

1. Acceptance of Conditions Governing the Procurement:

Offerors must indicate their acceptance of the conditions governing this procurement and all amendments to this RFP (if any) in their letter of transmittal of the proposal.

2. Incurring Cost:

Any cost incurred by the offeror in the preparation, transmittal, or presentation of any proposal or material submitted in response to this RFP shall be borne solely by the offeror. Any cost incurred by the Offeror for the setup and demonstration of any proposed equipment and/or system if applicable shall be borne solely by the offeror.

3. Amended Proposals:

An Offeror may submit an amended proposal before the deadline for receipt of proposals. Such amended proposals must be complete replacements for a previously submitted proposal and must be identified as such in a transmittal letter that accompanies the amended proposal. The MRGCD personnel will not merge, collate, or assemble proposal materials.

4. Offerors' Rights to Withdraw Proposal:

Offerors will be allowed to withdraw their proposals at any time before the deadline for receipt of proposals. The Offeror must submit a written withdrawal request signed by the offeror and addressed to the Procurement Manager. The approval or denial of withdrawal requests received

after the deadline for receipt of the proposals is at the discretion of the Procurement Manager.

5. Proposal Offer Firm:

Responses to this RFP, including the cost response form, will be considered firm for ninety (90) days after the due date for receipt of proposals or sixty (60) days after receipt of a best and final offer if one is submitted.

6. Disclosure of Proposal Contents:

The proposals will be kept confidential until a contract is awarded. At that time, all proposals and documents pertaining to the proposals will be open to the public, except for the material that is proprietary or confidential. The Procurement Officer will not disclose or make public any pages of a proposal on which the offeror has stamped or imprinted "proprietary" or "confidential" subject to the following requirements. Proprietary or confidential data shall be readily separable from the proposal to facilitate eventual public inspection of the non-confidential portion of the proposal. Confidential data is normally restricted to confidential financial information concerning the offeror's organization and data that qualifies as a trade secret in accordance with the Uniform Trade Secrets Act, 57-3A-1 to 57-3A-7 NMSA 1978. The price of products offered or the cost of services proposed shall not be designated as proprietary or confidential information. If a request is received for disclosure of data for which an Offeror has made a written request for confidentiality, the MRGCD shall examine the offeror's request and make a written determination that specifies which portions of the proposal should be disclosed. Unless the Offeror takes legal action to prevent the disclosure, the proposal will be so disclosed. The proposal shall be open to public inspection subject to any continuing prohibition on the disclosure of confidential data.

7. No Obligation:

This procurement in no manner obligates the MRGCD to the use of any proposed professional services until a valid written contract is awarded and approved by the appropriate authorities.

8. RFP Termination:

This RFP may be terminated at any time and all proposals may be rejected in whole or in part when the MRGCD determines such action to be in the best interest of the MRGCD.

9. Sufficient Appropriation:

Any contract awarded as a result of this RFP process may be terminated if sufficient appropriations or authorizations do not exist. Such termination will be effective by sending written notice to the offeror. The MRGCD's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations and authorizations are available will be accepted by the Offeror as final.

10. Legal Review:

The MRGCD requires that all offerors agree to be bound by the General Requirements contained in this RFP. Any Offeror's concerns must be promptly brought to the attention of the Procurement Manager.

11. Governing Law:

This procurement and any agreement with Offerors that may result shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Mexico.

12. Basis for Proposal:

Only information supplied by the Procurement Manager should be used as the basis for the preparation of Offeror proposals.

13. Terms and Conditions:

The contract between the MRGCD and the Offeror will follow the format specified by the MRGCD and the terms and conditions set forth in the New Mexico State Procurement Code, (Section 13-1-28 through Section 13-1-199 NMSA 1978). However, the MRGCD reserves the right to negotiate with a successful Offeror for provisions in addition to those contained in this RFP. The contents of this RFP, as revised and/or supplemented, and the successful offeror's proposal will be incorporated into and become part of the contract. Should an Offeror object to any of the MRGCD's terms and conditions, as contained in this Section that Offeror must propose specific alternative language. The MRGCD may or may not accept the alternative language. General references to the offeror's terms and conditions or attempts at complete substitutions are not acceptable and will result in disqualification of the Offeror's proposal. Offerors must provide a brief discussion of the purpose and impact, if any, of each proposed change followed by the specific proposed alternate wording.

Award of professional services contracts are subject to approval of the MRGCD's Board of Directors.

14. Offeror's Terms and Conditions:

Offerors must submit with the proposal a complete set of any additional terms and conditions which they expect to have included in a contract.

15. Contract Deviations:

Any additional terms and conditions, which may be the subject of negotiation, will be discussed only between the MRGCD and the selected Offeror and shall not be deemed an opportunity to amend the Offeror's proposal.

16. Offeror Qualifications:

The MRGCD may make such investigations as necessary to determine the ability of the offeror to adhere to the requirements specified within this RFP. The MRGCD may reject the proposal of any Offeror who is not a responsible offeror or fails to submit a responsive offer as defined by the conditions of this RFP.

17. Right to Waive Minor Irregularities:

The MRGCD reserves the right to waive minor irregularities and also reserves the right to waive Mandatory requirements provided that all of the otherwise responsive proposals failed to meet

the Mandatory requirements and/or doing so does not otherwise materially affect the procurement. This right will be exercised at the sole discretion of MRGCD.

18. Notice:

The Procurement Code, Sections 13-1-28 through 13-1-199 NMSA 1978, imposes civil and misdemeanor criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities, and kickbacks.

19. Agency Rights:

The MRGCD reserves the right to accept or reject all or a portion of an Offeror's proposal.

20. Right to Publish:

Throughout this procurement process and contract term, potential Offerors and actual Offerors must secure from the MRGCD a written approval before the release of any information that pertains to the potential work or activities covered by this procurement or the subsequent contract.

21. Ownership of Proposals:

All documents submitted in response to the RFP shall become the property of the MRGCD.

22. Electronic mail address required:

A large part of the communication regarding this procurement will be conducted by electronic mail (e-mail). The offeror must have a valid e-mail address to receive this correspondence.

23. Use of Electronic Versions of this RFP:

This RFP is being made available by electronic means. If accepted by such means, the offeror acknowledges and accepts full responsibility to ensure that no changes are made to the RFP. In the event of a conflict between a version of the RFP in the offeror's possession and the version maintained by the MRGCD, the version maintained by the MRGCD shall govern.

24. Records and Audit:

If awarded a contract, the Offeror shall maintain detailed time records, which indicate the date, time, and nature of services rendered. These records shall be subject to inspection by MRGCD, the Department of Finance and Administration, and the State Auditor. The MRGCD shall have the right to audit the billing both before and after payment; payment under this Contract shall not foreclose the right of the MRGCD to recover excessive payment.

25. New Mexico Employees Health Coverage

- a. If the Offeror has, or grows to, six (6) or more employees who work, or who are expected to work, an average of at least 20 hours per week over a six (6) month period during the term of the contract, the Offeror must agree to have in place, and agree to maintain for the term of the contract, health insurance for those employees if the expected annual value in the aggregate of any contracts between Contractor and the State exceed \$250,000.

b. The Offeror must agree to maintain a record of the number of employees who have (a) accepted health insurance; (b) decline health insurance due to other health insurance coverage already in place; or (c) decline health insurance for other reasons. These records are subject to review and audit by a representative of the State.

c. The Offeror must agree to advise all employees of the availability of State publicly financed health care coverage programs by providing each employee with, as a minimum, the following website link to additional information:

d. For Indefinite Quantity, Indefinite Delivery contracts (price agreements without specific limitations on quantity and providing for an indeterminate number of orders to be placed against it); these requirements shall apply the first day of the second month after the Offeror reports combined sales (from state and, if applicable, from local public bodies if from a state price agreement) of \$250,000.

A. General Information: (5 points, limited to two (2) pages)

1. Must have at minimum 5 years experience in the representation of local governmental units in New Mexico. Offeror must include complete details of the firm's and/or individual experience in the legal representation of small governmental units in New Mexico, including familiarity with the New Mexico Procurement Code, New Mexico State Statutes, and enabling legislation for the MRGCD. Offeror must also describe experience in New Mexico Water Law and Administration and experience in Endangered Species issues specific to the Middle Rio Grande.
2. Name and Address of your organization or office and nature of the organization (individual, partnership or corporation, private or public, profit or non-profit).
3. Size of Organization
4. General description of your organization's history, capabilities, experience, expertise, and philosophy.

B. Proposed approach to providing cost-effective representation: (15 points, limited to four (4) pages)

1. Provide a narrative description of the steps routinely taken and procedures routinely used to ensure that legal representation is provided on a cost-effective basis. Discuss matters such as settlement strategy.

2. Discuss how you would propose to manage a case that might be unusual or beyond the scope of this contract, especially with regard to controlling costs.

C – H Experience in areas of Law: (70 Points limited to ten (10) pages)

Describe how the services will be provided or what tasks will be performed in response to the Evaluation Criteria and the Scope of Work. The scope of work indicates “what” the Offeror is supposed to do; the description of services should allow “how” the Offeror intends to perform the services.

Discuss prior experience and qualification related to accomplishing the Scope of Work contained in Section V. This portion of the proposal should demonstrate the extent to which the Offeror is qualified to perform both the scope of work outlined in this RFP and the specific services contained in the description of services portion of the Offeror’s proposal. Indicate those lawyers and legal assistants with your firm who would be assigned to work in these areas, with the following information.

1. Name;
2. Number of years of practicing in the area of law, specialization, if any;
3. Date licensed in New Mexico, if applicable;
4. A summary of his/her educational background, special training, award;
5. A summary of his/her general litigation experience;
6. A summary of his/her experience in the selected area of law;
7. A summary of his/her experience with governmental entity issues;
8. A listing of his/her CLE classes for the 2 calendar years; and
9. For three (3) significant cases mentioned in the experience summaries, provide a reference person who can be contacted regarding the work performed.

I. Cost Proposal: (10 points fill in form as required)

For each category of personnel, indicate the hourly rate to be charged. Also, indicate the type and amount of any expenses per State of New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration guidelines.

Include the following items in the cost proposal:

1. Proposed rate per hour for each category of personnel assigned to the project.
2. The types and amounts of any additional costs, such as out-of-pocket expenses.
3. Applicable gross receipts tax

J. Supplementary Information (Zero Points, limited to eight (8) pages)

Related Experience and Qualifications - This information may be provided in addition to the required information contained in the Proposal (Section C-H above). Although no evaluation points are assigned for supplementary information, they may be considered and may contribute to points awarded in each category of the proposal. Supplemental

information may include, but is not limited to, the following:

1. The names of all attorneys who are associated with the organization or office and the nature of their association (partner, shareholder, associate, etc.)
2. Detailed resumes
3. Regular - client references, preferably government entities.

K. Current Clients and Conflict of Interest, Campaign Contribution, Debarment & Suspension, and Acknowledgement of Receipt Form: Mandatory:

1. Please list all current or former clients (including pro bono) pertaining to representation of local governmental units, water issues, or real property matters, within the State of New Mexico within the past five (5) years.
2. Please identify any foreseeable or potential conflicts of interest that would result from such representation and how you would propose to resolve such conflicts.

**SECTION IV
RESPONSE FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION**

A. Number of Responses

Offerors shall submit only one proposal for General Counsel Services.

B. Number of Copies

Offerors shall deliver one (1) original and Seven (7) identical copies of their proposal.

C. Proposal Format

Offerors shall organize their proposal as follows:

D. Letter of Transmittal (limited to two pages)

Include at least the following information:

1. Name, address, and telephone number of the Offeror;
2. Name and telephone number of primary contact;
3. Signature of the offeror or of an officer or employee who certifies that he/she has the authority to bind the Offeror;
4. Date of the proposal;
5. A statement that the offeror, if awarded the contract, will comply with contract terms and conditions outlined in this RFP;
6. A statement that the offeror's proposal is valid for ninety (90) days after the deadline for submission of proposals.

SECTION V
SCOPE OF WORK

Offeror will handle all of the legal business of the MRGCD, and perform those duties prescribed by the Board of Directors and CEO / Chief Engineer of the MRGCD, Including ensuring maximum protection of the MRGCD legal rights within the limits prescribed by law. These services may include, but are not limited to the following areas:

- A. Shall be responsible for drafting intergovernmental agreements related to joint management of the Bosque, levee construction and maintenance, maintenance of irrigation works on Pueblo lands, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) floodplain issues, and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) water quality issues. Assist in drafting State and Federal legislation. Attend hearings of legislative committees and testify as requested.
- B. Shall be responsible for drafting contracts, leases, agreements, construction contracts, deeds, resolutions, material leases, easements, rights of way, and other legal documents as requested.
- C. Shall assist in responding to IPRA requests as requested by staff.
- D. Shall respond to or work with insurance defense counsel in connection with lawsuits pertaining to flooding, drowning, and other tort matters, and quiet title, foreclosure, bankruptcy, condemnation suits, and workers compensation matters.
- E. Shall institute legal proceedings whenever requested to do so by the Board of Directors, and accept services of process for and entering the appearance of MRGCD in the legal proceedings instituted against it, and representing MRGCD, the Board of Directors, and the officers and employees of MRGCD for acts performed in their official capacity, in any trial in which any of them is a party, in compliance with the open meeting act.
- F. Shall be lead in human resource or employment law issues, recognizing that MRGCD may contract with a law firm engaged to assist with these services.

If it is later determined that the Bidder knowingly rendered an erroneous certification, in addition to other remedies available to MRGCD, MRGCD may terminate the contract resulting from this request for bids for default.

The certification provided by the Bidder in paragraph (a), below, will be considered in connection with a determination of the Bidder's responsibility. A certification that any of the items in paragraph (a), below, exists may result in the rejection of the Bidder’s bid for nonresponsibility and the withholding of an award under this RFB. If the Bidder’s certification indicates that that any of the items in paragraph (a), below, exists, the Bidder shall provide with its bid a full written explanation of the specific basis for, and circumstances connected to, the item; the Bidder’s failure to provide such explanation will result in rejection of the Bidder’s bid. If the Bidder’s certification indicates that that any of the items in paragraph (a), below, exists, MRGCD, in its sole discretion, may request, that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services grant an exception under 45 C.F.R. §§ 76.120 and 76.305 if MRGCD believes that the procurement schedule so permits and an exception is applicable and warranted under the circumstances. In no event will MRGCD award a contract to a Bidder if the requested exception is not granted for the Bidder.

(a)(1) By signing and submitting a bid in response to this RFB, the Bidder certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief, that:

(i) The Bidder and/or any of its Principals-

- (A) Are are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, or declared ineligible for the award of contracts by any Federal department or agency;
