AGENDA ITEM NO. 1 – PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

DeAnna Philips led the Pledge of Allegiance at today's meeting.

Chairman Kelly was absent from today's meeting. Director Russo Baca chaired today's meeting and declared a quorum. The meeting was publicly noticed. This meeting was a hybrid meeting with Vice Chairman Baugh attending virtually. Rollcall votes will be necessary for regular motions.

Mr. Casuga led a moment of silence for Raydell Latoma.

Mr. Casuga explained the pumping fee amendment they made to try and conserve as much water as possible.

Director Dunning made the **MOTION TO APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA.**
Seconded by Director Lopez. The **MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.**

AGENDA ITEM NO. 4 - REPORT(S) FROM THE WATER OPERATIONS

- a. **Report on Water Supply Conditions - Anne Marken, River Operations & Telemetry Manager**

Ms. Marken gave a report on water supply conditions. She shared the Middle Rio Grande has experienced a significant 95 miles dry river length, as the average annual dry length has been 37 river miles. She stated there have been a few rain events over the past month, but they did not produce enough to improve water supply, and there is only 9 CFS crossing the Colorado-New Mexico state line on the main stem of the Rio Grande. She added there is only 16 CFS flowing at the Rio Chama and 280 CFS at the Otowi Gage, which is the lowest ever been recorded at this site at this point in the year, and there is a 500 CFS gap between what they need to meet irrigation demand and what is available. She expressed the amount of native Rio Grande water being produced by the basin is not sufficient to meet the needs of the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos, which has caused non-tribal use upstream of Isleta Pueblo to be curtailed, and BOR is releasing P&P water from storage. She noted that will remain curtailed until rain inflows increase available supply in locations that can benefit those lands. She said the landscape is very dry, which is going to limit the amount of runoff any rain events can produce. She stated the forecast for this week calls for temperatures in the 80s and some chances for rain, so they are getting prepared for potential rain inflow; however, the seasonal outlook continues to show elevated chances of above average temperatures and equal chances for above or below average precipitation. She shared MRGCD received authorization to move forward with the pilot Low Flow Conveyance Channel monsoon operation, which will allow them to divert up to 200 CFS from monsoon events into the Low Flow Conveyance Channel at the San Acacia intake gates

to try and help improve Compact deliveries during monsoon season. She thanked those involved in getting the necessary compliance work done in time for monsoon season.

Mr. Casuga thanked staff, Mr. Ish, and Ms. Marken, and all that participated in the work, the State of New Mexico, who took responsibility of paying for it and working through the EA process, and BOR for moving as diligently as they could. He said it is an important step for the state and MRGCD to show the value of trying to move water all 12 months of the year and the partnership should be celebrated.

b. Report on Water Distribution - Matt Martinez, Irrigation Distribution Manager

Mr. Martinez gave the report on water distribution. He expressed the first half of the season was full of historically low spring runoff, limited water supply, and prolonged P&P operations. He said these conditions have severely limited irrigation opportunities and left many non-Pueblo properties in significant stress. He recapped the last six weeks, which have included operating prior and paramount restrictions 31 of the last 42 days. He expressed there were two brief opportunities during the last six weeks that allowed meaningful irrigation deliveries, but they were still not enough to reach all the irrigations needing water. He said they continue to work with BIA and Pueblo representatives to honor the senior water rights of the Pueblos. He shared, based on reports, flow data, and communication with Pueblo staff and water users, there has been significant supply to meet priority water rights thanks to P&P releases, and MRGCD defers to BIA regarding P&P releases and distribution of deliveries for the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos. He voiced that high temperatures have increased water demand and system depletions and prolonged P&P operations created understandable frustration among Non-Pueblo irrigators. He said they track each area's irrigation status throughout the season, which allows them to respond immediately. He added meaningful monsoon runoff is the best opportunity to improve irrigation conditions, and he asked that irrigators remain prepared to take deliveries in short notice for when water is available. He expressed that they understand the hardship these conditions have taken on irrigators and they appreciate their continued patience and understanding, and hopefully they will get some relief in the second half of the season. He recognized the passing of Raydell Latoma, who dedicated over a year of service to the MRGCD, who will be greatly missed, and whose contributions to the District will not be forgotten.

Director Jiron commented since the last board meeting, the Peralta Main has been low, but when farmers needed the water, they were filling the ditch up quite fast. He thanked them for that. He added they were also able to get water in the canal a few times and it has been working fine. He noted he heard from some constituents off the Big Chical that the ISOs are doing the best they can to get them water, and he was happy to hear that.

Mr. Martinez responded they appreciate the coordination and communication from the Pueblo so they can make those adjustments and get water where needed.

Mr. Casuga added he has gotten more questions this year than ever about P&P operations from non-tribal members and reemphasized the MRGCD recognizes the senior water rights of the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos and are in partnership with BIA. He said the system was designed to make sure they continue delivering water until there is no water available and that the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos would be the last users of the water on the Rio Grande in extreme drought. He noted the system they

have today that is interconnected at four diversions would not exist without the Pueblos consenting to easements and they have their own diversions. He expressed to the public that they do see the struggle, but MRGCD is fulfilling their commitment in partnership with BIA that they made a long time ago so they could enjoy the system they have today.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 5 - ITEMS FROM THE FLOOR (Comments are limited to three (3) minutes)

Santiago Maestas

Mr. Maestas, with the South Valley Regional Association of Acequias, followed up on the comments he made at the last meeting. He thanked them for their transparency with the minutes and comments made by the public. He announced the Pueblo joined their protest on the water transfer from the Indian Lateral, and they were able to access the Office of the State Engineer's water rights summary pages in regard to where the water rights were used on the pecan farm. He explained it was based on a permit, not pre-1907 water rights, and the total acreage is 837 and the total diversion is 1,149 acre feet per year. He added it was a supplemental well permit issued to the properties in 1964, and 68 acre feet are the pre-1907 water rights of the pecan farm. He interprets that as it being MRGDCD water that was used to divert from the Belen Highline Canal to these properties when there was water, but he has been using the permit to pump water from the shallow aquifer for the last several years. He expressed that is unfair and they are disappointed that the District did not join the protest, but felt it should be investigated.

Shellie Wright

Ms. Wright shared she has a property in Bosque Farms and is protesting any future annual charges for water services. She stated the last time her property was irrigated was in May 2022, when her father passed, whose property was adjacent to hers. She said when they sold the property, the new owners refused to let water cross the property for her to irrigate hers and still refuses to this day, so she asks MRGCD to assess that property to confirm the ditch actually ends on her property, so they can stop any future billing of water rights to her place.

Mr. Casuga responded their Lands & Conservation team could help with that.

Vincent Sanchez

Mr. Sanchez addressed MRGCD as a fellow steward of acequias and informed them of a significant change that would directly affect operations. He explained the current Village of Los Ranchos Zoning Director recommended to the Commission that all private or MRGCD controlled acequias have the 25 foot setback rule eliminated in favor of 15 for all structures abutting acequias, which will increase the encroachment of structures onto acequia setbacks by 60%. He expressed that important clarity was lacking on where the measurement will be taken from. He asked if there were any engineered recommendations for structures and their proximity to earthen acequias, and he hoped MRGCD had an opinion on this, as MRGCD's access at a minimum of 60% per side reduction of working space would negatively affect the ability to do state required duties. The amendment was made available last week and will be voted on tomorrow.

Director Russo Baca voiced that she received his e-mail and sent it to staff for review.

Mr. Casuga added they will have staff in the audience tomorrow night and will probably provide a comment stating they would not like to see that change happen until they are directly coordinated with. He expressed he did not know why they were doing that, and said their setback area cannot be within MRGCD lands, as the setback actually resides on the private property, not MRGCD's. He added MRGCD puts machinery in, and any setback that shrinks down the ability to turn that machinery could impact their ability to do certain maintenance.

Jorge Garcia

Mr. Garcia, Director of CESOSS, presented on major initiatives they are going to be working on in the coming year, which include community water stewardship and a signed petition to request a moratorium on water transfer to be able to offset some of their crazy suggestions, Valle Vista open classroom, Atrisco Memorial Project with a mural across from the Rio Grande and signage for Atrisco Memorial, and the Atrisco Acequia Madre.

AGENDA ITEM NO.6 - REPORT(S) FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR -

- b. Bureau of Indian Affairs - Patrick Taber, Acting Designated Engineer**

Mr. Taber presented for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He first thanked the Board for the recognition and moment of silence for Mr. Latoma. He pointed out of the P&P releases they saw on Ms. Marken's graph, approximately two-thirds is stored water, so 190 CFS per day of the 280 at Otowi is released P&P water. He said he is working with the Pueblos and Mr. Martinez on making sure they are getting the distribution ironed out as well as they can. He noted there were reports of some upstream users trying to take some of the Pueblo's water. He stated they have been working on trying to isolate points of contact to make it easier to work through coordination efforts. He added offseason projects are coming up, and he will need to work with the District on prioritizing those they normally request through the work request system. He shared there have been normal maintenance issues there have already been requests for coordination on.

Mr. Jiron extended his appreciation for the work Mr. Taber has done with the District and for coming down to the Pueblo to look at the problems they are experiencing.

Director Russo Baca asked about the current amount released and stored for P&P.

Mr. Taber answered approximately 10,000 acre feet has been released and around 16,000-17,000 acre feet remaining.

Mr. Casuga asked to encourage the Pueblos to put O&M in. He said offseason O&M actions do not necessarily have to wait until the offseason, especially if requiring advanced engineering. He said the sooner they let them know, the sooner they can get started on it.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 7 - REPORT(S) FROM THE DIRECTOR OF HUMAN RESOURCES-
Christine L. Nardi, MBA

a. Introduction of MRGCD New Hires

Ms. Nardi introduced the new hires and job changes, which consist of a new Assessment and Collections Lead in the General Office, a promotion to Medium Equipment Operator and two new Field Maintenance Technicians in the Cochiti Division, a transfer to Medium Equipment Operator and a new Field Maintenance Technician in the Albuquerque Division, promotion to Heavy Equipment Operator and a transfer from in the Belen Division, and a returnee as Right-of-Way Specialist in the Socorro Division.

b. Recognition of Retiring Employee - Estella Gamboa, Assessment & Collections Supervisor

Ms. Nardi recognized Estella Gamboa, as she is retiring on July 24th, presented her with a plaque and other gifts, and thanked her for her service to the MRGCD. She thanked her for everything she has done for the District.

Ms. Gamboa thanked everyone for their hard work, being there for her during the tough times, and for giving her the opportunity to end her career there.

DeAnna Philips expressed her appreciation and thanks to Ms. Gamboa as well.

The Board members congratulated Ms. Gamboa on her retirement and thanked her for the professionalism she brought to the MRGCD.



AGENDA ITEM NO. 8 - REPORT(S) FROM THE CHIEF PROCUREMENT OFFICER - Richard DeLoia

a. Consideration/Approval for MRGCD's Habitat Conservation Plan

Mr. DeLoia presented on the approval for the MRGCD Habitat Conservation Plan RFP. He stated the request for proposals was advertised on February 13th, 18th, and 24th, and nine were received by the deadline. He added the MRGCD Evaluation Committee recommends award to Tetra Tech in the amount of \$1,487,599.21.

Director Dunning asked if they were expecting it to be that much money. She also wanted to abstain from the vote, as her daughter works for Tetra Tech in another state, and wanted to avoid any conflict of interest.

Mr. DeLoia answered yes, it will take a few years to get through.

Ondrea Hummel, Tetra Tech Manager with the Albuquerque Office introduced herself and she looked forward to working with the MRGCD through this process.

Director Russo Baca made the **MOTION TO GO BACK INTO REGULAR SESSION**. Seconded by Director Jiron. Rollcall vote was administered with all members voting yes. The **MOTION CARRIED**.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 9 - REPORT(S) FROM THE DIRECTOR OF LANDS & CONSERVATION - Casey Ish

a. Consideration/Approval of Memorandum of Agreement between MRGCD and National Academy of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine for the Upper Rio Grande Basin Federal Reservoir Operations Study

Mr. Ish stated a few years ago there was a Water Resources Development Act activity for the Corps of Engineers to review and study how to optimize federal reservoirs within the Rio Grande Basin, and that has now been funded and is ready to move forward. He said there is local cost share and several other entities that are looking to partner on getting this study done. He explained this is the agreement between MRGCD and that National Academy of Sciences (NAS) for that work. He noted NAS prides themselves on independence of their research and this will help inform some subsequent changes to potential authorizations if they find there are things MRGCD can be doing better with their reservoirs. He looked forward to working with NAS, Reclamation, Utility Authority, and possibly Sante Fe on this.

Director Russo Baca made the **MOTION TO APPROVE THE MOA BETWEEN MRGCD AND NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES, ENGINEERING, AND MEDICINE FOR THE UPPER RIO GRANDE BASIN FEDERAL RESERVOIR OPERATIONS STUDY**. Seconded by Director Dunning. Rollcall vote was administered with all members voting yes. The **MOTION CARRIED**.

Mr. Ish stated this is a follow-up on a discussion the Board had at the last board meeting on the draft resolution, where staff brought about a policy where the District may begin acquiring water rights for various reasons. He said they had a thorough discussion and he entertained any additional topics today in terms of the policy.

Mr. Casuga noted they discussed the draft resolution at the last meeting, with the intention to bring it back for consideration/approval, but he seceded to legal counsel on that.

Ms. Wiggins responded that anything listed on the agenda is subject to action even if it was listed as draft instead of consideration/approval on the agenda.

Director Dunning commented everything was covered very thoroughly in the draft resolution.

c. Report on the Urban Issues Advisory Committee Inaugural Meeting, June 15, 2026 - Casey Ish, Director of Lands & Conservation, Amanda Molina, Director of Communications, Vice Chair Baugh, Directors Dunning and Russo Baca

Director Russo Baca expressed she did a written report on this.

Mr. Ish explained this was the first meeting with the newly formed group, and they had a good initial discussion even though there was not full attendance. He listed the top five issues the group was interested and engaged in trying to address, which was land use planning, access policies, education and outreach, wildfire and vegetation management, and declining Cottonwood and native tree canopy, and legislative matters.

AGENDA NO. 10 - REPORT(S) FROM THE DIRECTOR OF TECHNICAL SERVICES - Alicia Lopez, PE

a. Update on Corrales Siphon

Ms. Lopez shared what they can expect from her in the next few months back, including gathering lots of information, understanding where they are in their maintenance and engineering program, and defining a starting point to improve where they can do better. She said that along with her team, they will start defining key performance indicators and define how the metrics and success align with their long-term vision.

She gave an update on the Corrales Siphon. She stated the Corrales site contract was executed in September, Compass started obtaining permits, and in December they were allowed to mobilize based on the final agreement with Sandia Pueblo. In March, they had the issues with the auger getting stuck as they began drilling operations, and DH Underground attempted to install the first step of the horizontal directional drill on the conductor casing, but they could not remove the casing or auger, which remains in place. She said they decided to install a second casing slightly to the west of the existing alignment and that was successful and completed in May. She added prep for the HGD operation has restarted and there is a plan forward. She expressed the project received a \$7 million Water Trust Board Grant, with an expiration date of December 31, 2026, which they are working diligently to get done. She noted there are approved and unapproved change orders associated with this work, but Wilson & Company, MRGCD, and the owner are working to identify a logical distribution of overages.

Dan Aguirre, with Wilson & Company, gave the Board a schedule on how they plan to proceed forward. He gave Compass credit for going out of their way to get a second subcontractor, because Global was not going to be able to get on site very quickly. He stated NPL is going to do the initial pilot holes and reaming to get the bore to the 60-inch size they need, which they plan to start next week. He said they hoped to get the final drilling plan tomorrow so they can start drilling next week, and the pad has been getting built in the last week to get that machine set up. He explained the process of inserting the centralizer casing, and then they will pull the pipe through. He noted the whole process and cleanup should be done by mid-September. After that, they have the weir to put in and the head wall and riprap that goes in, which they have been talking to the contractor about doing concurrently. He added they are also looking at if there is a way to bypass the weir structure and get that built right away, but right now the contractor is on schedule to be done by Thanksgiving.

Director Dunning asked if there was a possibility for a second extension or if it had to be done by that time. She thanked them for trying their best to meet the deadline.

Mr. Aguirre answered they are going to make it happen as best they can.

Director Russo Baca appreciated their diligence of saying they will make it happen.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 11 - REPORT(S) FROM THE SECRETARY-TREASURER/CFO - Pamela Fanelli, CMA, CGFM

a. Review of End of Fiscal Year 2026 and Fourth Quarter Financials

Ms. Fanelli presented on the Fiscal Year 2026 unaudited financial report. She reported the District finished the year very strong and is well positioned to begin Fiscal Year 27. In the General Fund, they adopted a balanced budget originally, but during the year, they adopted some budget adjustments totaling a \$2.7 million impact on the budget. She said the total revenues for Fiscal Year 2026 year-to-date is \$33,626,000, ad valorem revenues represent 77% of total revenues, General Fund revenues are expected to exceed budgeted revenues, General Fund expenditures total \$32,760,000, and salaries and fringes making up the largest portion of the expenditures. She noted they are expecting to see a surplus in the General Fund. For the Grant Fund, actual grant revenue totaled \$21.8 million during the fiscal year. Approximately \$8 million of the

budgeted grant funded projects will not occur in fiscal year 2026 and will be re-budgeting in Fiscal Year 27. She expressed they are going to rebudget a portion of the Socorro Lining Project again in Fiscal Year 27. Since NFWF grant had a delay in signing the contracts, they are rebudgeting in Fiscal Year 27. She shared the Capital Investment Fund generated revenues above budgeted and revenues that came from ad valorem, but they continue funding equipment purchases, infrastructure improvements, temporary Corrales Siphon pumping operations, and transfers from the Capital Investment Fund went to the Debt Service Fund and Grant Fund for grant match. The Debt Service Fund remained healthy and scheduled debt payments were made on time. She expressed that Fiscal Year 26 was a financially successful year overall.

Director Dunning thought they were going to do a cost benefit analysis for utilities cost to see if it was worthwhile to get solar in this building and the Division offices.

Ms. Fanelli answered that has not been done yet, but they plan to. She noted that would go into their Capital expenditures, which will reduce General Fund expenditures.

Director Dunning asked if they were still running electricity to the Corrales pumps since there is no water to pump.

Mr. Casuga responded yes, there is lighting out there, but the bill should be significantly lower.

Director Russo Baca requested seeing the ad valorem by county on the pie chart.

b. Report on Audit Entrance Conference, July 13, 2026 - Pamela Fanelli, Secretary-Treasurer/CFO and Director Russo Baca

Director Russo Baca reminded the Board to answer any calls from CRI.

Ms. Fanelli gave the report on the Audit Entrance Conference, where they went over what everyone's responsibilities are during the audit and any areas of concern they had. She said they project the audit be completed by November 30, 2026.

c. Consideration/Approval of Resolution BA-07-13-26-116 Fiscal Year 2026 Fourth Quarter Unaudited Financial Report and Cash Balance Review as of July 1, 2026

d. Consideration/Approval of the Travel Policy to reflect changes to State Statutes 10-8-1- to 10-8-8 NMSA 1978

Ms. Fanelli stated that State Statute 10-8, 1 through 8, changed the Travel Policy, so they are asking for approval of the new Travel Policy, but it will change the per diem and mileage rates for board members.

Director Dunning commented that in the statute, it sounds like they could make their own rules in some instances, but it was hard to figure out where they would have the authority to make their own rules.

Mr. Casuga responded right now the resolution just brings them in line with what the state is doing and there is a conversation to be had with counsel if they do or do not fall within the state purview.

Ms. Wiggins reviewed it and made some language suggestions that were incorporated in regard to emphasizing expenses that are incurred have to be consistent with the employees' duties, course and scope of employment, and duties as elected officials of public officers. She added if there are any questions about if something is appropriate to seek reimbursement for, they should be asked beforehand.

Director Dunning made the **MOTION TO APPROVE THE NEW TRAVEL POLICY**. Seconded by Director Lopez. Rollcall vote was administered with all members voting yes. The **MOTION CARRIED**.

Ms. Molina shared she has gotten a lot of invites from the community for MRGCD to be at the events since her time there, and many board members and staff attend those. She showed some photos from the Socorro Truck Event.

Mr. Lopez was there with his grandkids and thought it was a really nice event and said the kids enjoyed the equipment.

a. Report on MRGCD's Valencia County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting, June 18, 2026 - Jason M. Casuga, Chief Engineer/CEO, Chairman Kelly, Directors Dunning, Sandoval, Jiron, Lopez and Russo Baca

Mr. Casuga reported on the Valencia County Community and Socorro County Community & Farmers Informational Meetings. He appreciated the community coming and engaging with them and the emotions they bring in, their thoughtful and composed questions. He shared some of the new things they are looking at doing, including producing material available to the public to be informed on bigger items they are going to talk about and a direct ask portion. He said they heard from constituents on hydrology, no hope to store water because of the Compact debt, and getting themselves in better position to manage water and the future. He expressed New Mexico is now in a position to control their own destiny more. He talked about there being a need and value to have at least three board members be able to see some of those materials. He expressed that among the Executive Team, they had a conversation about the product they can produce and being able to take questions from the community and coming up with a podcast element, where they get together and have those questions posted to staff and recorded and give the community access to it. He felt the next logical step is to make it where people can readily access those questions.

Director Dunning suggested they could ask questions on the chat and then answer those questions on the chat, and it would still be recorded so anybody could listen to it later like they did with the Water Advocates did with their Zoom Meeting on conservation.

Mr. Casuga responded they were happy to do that, but will not be creating a new public meeting to people to attend. He added they were likely going to do a studio recording, which will produce into a transcript. He said every time they get something unique they have not covered, that would be a good opportunity to update that.

Director Russo Baca delegated it to the Irrigation Committee to be the committee reviewing those materials before publishing.

He expressed they came out of the community meetings convinced it should not be MRGCD doing all the work on the Low Flow and the state should jump in and get that lower piece and let MRGCD act as their agent.

Mr. Thompson added he would send the agenda as soon as it is available.

- Produce an annual CESOSS–MRGCD Partnership Report with measurable outcomes.

Memorandum of Agreement

This Memorandum of Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered this 10th day of June, 2025 (the "Effective Date") by the Center for Social Sustainable Systems (CESOSS), a 501c3 nonprofit organization and U.S. tax-exempt public charity ("Grantee") with the address of 211 10th ST SW, Albuquerque, NM 87102, to induce Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District (MRGCD), a quasi-governmental entity under the state of New Mexico ("Grantor") with its principal place of business at 1931 Second Street SW, Albuquerque, NM 87102, and mailing address of P.O. Box 581, Albuquerque, NM 87103, to make a grant in the initial amount of U.S. \$25,000 in fiscal year 2026 to Grantee for operational support to conduct outreach and implementation of water resource and acequia focused education as described below (the "Purpose").

WHEREAS the mission of Grantee is to protect and preserve ways of life and traditions connected to land and water issues in the Middle Rio Grande region; and

WHEREAS the mission of Grantor is to provide irrigation, drainage, and river flood protection services while preserving the ecological, cultural and quality of life values within the middle Rio Grande valley; and

WHEREAS the Rio Grande and its tributaries within New Mexico (the "Rio Grande Watershed") is a major source of water for more than half of the state's population, including those living in metropolitan and rural communities and on Native American Pueblo and tribal lands as well as approximately 55,000 acres of irrigated farmland from Cochiti Dam to Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge; and

WHEREAS the Grantee serves communities in the Middle Rio Grande region by protecting and preserving ways of life and traditions connected to land and water through education-based programs and projects which help to maintain the viability of agriculture and ecosystem resiliency in the middle Rio Grande valley, MRGCD's service area; and

WHEREAS the Grantee increases the education and engagement of the public with issues related to the viability of agriculture and ecosystem resiliency in the middle Rio Grande valley, MRGCD's service area; and

WHEREAS the Grantor has need for community outreach services to support programmatic goals for improving constituent knowledge while advancing preservation of agricultural lands and related water supplies particularly as it relates to the traditional acequias and communities within the benefited area of the District,

NOW THEREFORE, Grantee and Grantor (collectively the "Parties") agree to the following:

1. **Grant Implementation.** The initial amount of the Grant (as defined below) is \$25,000, but Grantor may increase the amount of the Grant throughout the Term (as

defined below), if additional funds are appropriated and made available by Grantor, by providing written notice to Grantee of such increases. For the purposes of the Agreement and notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the Contrary, the defined term the "Grant" means the initial amount of \$25,000 plus the cumulative amount of any additional funds granted by Grantor to Grantee under this Agreement. Beginning in fiscal year 2026 (July 1, 2025) Grantor will deliver the amount of \$25,000 to Grantee in two installments: one of \$12,500 on or before July 15, 2025; and one of \$12,500 on or before March 1, 2026. Grantor shall continue future installments on or before August 1 and March 1 in subsequent years as defined in the Term. Grantor will deliver any amounts of the Grant to Grantee on a similar schedule. Grantor and Grantee agree that Grantee requires advances of the Grant funds (rather than reimbursements of already-expended funds) in order to pursue the Purpose. Grantee will provide annual progress reports to Grantor that describe how the immediately preceding advance of the Grant funds was utilized by Grantee and how any upcoming advance is intended to be utilized by Grantee. Grantee will use the Grant received from Grantor only for the Purpose.

The Parties acknowledge that Grantee will have full control and responsibility over the planning, content, terms and implementation to achieve the Purpose and that any line items of the budget may be adjusted among categories to meet the Purpose. Grantee will retain its organizational authority to select contractors and grantees according to its own policies and procedures, including those related to due diligence procedures and the Conflict of Interest Policy, while assuring such parties' qualifications and performance are appropriate to achieve the Purpose and to meet the legal requirements for a U.S. public charity in the jurisdiction where the work is performed. As such, if any party identified in a proposal is not selected or retained, another party or Grantee employees with appropriate qualifications may be selected by Grantee to complete the work to achieve the Purpose.

2. **Term.** The Term of the Grant is five consecutive years beginning on August 1, 2025, and continuing through June 30, 2030 (the "Term").
3. **Warranties and Representations of Grantee.** The Grant shall not be used for anything other than the Purpose. Grantee is a tax-exempt U.S. public charity. In the event that there is any change in Grantee's tax-exempt status, Grantee will immediately notify Grantor of such change.
4. **Annual and Final Reports.** Within sixty (60) days following the end of each of Grantor's fiscal year and the expiration of the Term, Grantee shall submit an annual report and a final report. The final report will include a description of all work funded under the Grant performed each year during the Term.

5. **Amendments.** This Agreement may be amended from time to time upon the written agreement of the Parties.
6. **Books and Records.** Grantee shall maintain records in accordance with General Accepted Accounting Practices and as required to maintain records for internal Code purposes. The reports submitted to Grantor shall be kept for at least six (6) years after completion of the use of all Grant funds. Grantee will permit Grantor, or its duly authorized representative to inspect records reflecting all work done, labor performed, and material furnished in connection with the activities funded under this Agreement.
7. **Intellectual Property.** Rights to any intellectual property created in part or wholly with funds under this Agreement vest solely with Grantee. Grantor may receive up to 10 copies of any final publications produced under this Agreement at no cost.
8. **Publicity.** Any publicity related to the work funded by this Agreement shall be approved by both Parties, prior to disseminating.
9. **Remedies.** Grantee agrees that Grantor may withhold Grant funds or terminate any commitment under this Agreement if Grantee fails to comply with the Agreement. Grantee may terminate this Agreement in the event it determines that the work undertaken or this Agreement will violate its policies or standard operating procedures or result in adverse publicity to Grantee.
10. **Choice of Law.** The law of the State of New Mexico exclusively shall govern and apply to any and all legal proceedings pertaining to the Agreement, including the provisions of the New Mexico Trust Claims Act. This Agreement shall be deemed to be entered into and formed in the New Mexico and shall become effective when Grantor executes this instrument, bearing its CEO's signature. By execution of this Agreement, Grantee submits to the personal jurisdiction and venue of the courts of New Mexico.
11. **Termination for Lack of Appropriations.** Funding for the initial \$25,000 of the Grant has been appropriated by Grantor's governing board. Notwithstanding any other provisions in this Agreement, its continuation beyond the end of the fiscal year is contingent on Grantor's governing board making the appropriations necessary to fund the Agreement which Grantor's governing board may make or not in its sole and absolute discretion. If the Grantor's governing board does not make appropriations for a fiscal year, this Agreement may be terminated at the end of the Grantor's current fiscal year upon written notice given by Grantor to Grantee. Such termination shall not constitute a default. All payment obligations of the Grantor and all its interest in the Agreement will cease upon the date of termination. Grantor's decision whether to make shall be accepted by Grantee and shall be final.
12. **Termination for Convenience.** Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving at least thirty (30) consecutive calendar days' notice in writing of such termination to the other party. In the event this Agreement is terminated for any

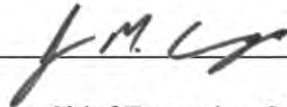
reason other than a material default by Grantee, Grantor will pay Grantee for any work performed or expenses incurred, as of the termination date.

13. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement sets forth the entire understanding of the parties concerning the Grant and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous communications and negotiations, both oral and written, relating to the Agreement.

Exhibit A
To Memorandum of Agreement

Grantee's work in the middle Rio Grande, funded by this Agreement, may include various combinations of the following tasks, as reasonably determined by Grantee and Grantor:

1. Conduct public outreach and education to promote agricultural land and water conservation efforts to stakeholders in the MRGCD. Organize, publicize, coordinate, or participate in at least four community workshops per year. Participate in community events and produce articles and public service announcements in various media sources (print, online, radio, social media) acknowledging the funding and contribution of Grantor.
2. Research and apply for prospective third-party funding sources to fund development of alternative public/private funding partnerships for meeting the MRGCD's and the Grantee's goals related to land and water preservation and conservation.
3. Coordinate with appropriate MRGCD staff and partners in efforts to protect and promote agricultural lands, water preservation, and conservation in the MRGCD service area.
4. Coordinate with other private and public partners, on efforts that promote and preserve the ecological, cultural and quality of life values within the middle Rio Grande valley.
5. Coordinate with other private and public partners on efforts to promote and further develop educational outreach specific to acequia protection and preservation in the middle Rio Grande valley.
6. Initially work with Bernalillo County and MRCOG to capitalize on existing networks and programs to optimize efforts to raise community awareness regarding the importance of sustaining agricultural practices and ecosystem resiliency in the middle Rio Grande valley. As capacities expand, CESSOS will expand into other counties and communities within MRGCD's service area.
7. This program will emphasize the need to educate area youth regarding the importance of the preservation of farmlands and water within the MRGCD while supporting efforts to recruit and sustain young farmers interested in small farm agribusiness.

Grantee may use the funds received within the project area as determined by Grantee in its reasonable discretion.

Strategic Plan

Vision: To create sustainable, healthy, and thriving communities where traditions connected to land and water are protected, preserved, and passed on to future generations.

Mission: To develop sustainable community-based and culturally centered events, programs, activities, and initiatives to empower and preserve the traditions and science-based practices of local and Indigenous communities, related to land, water, and human development.

Goal 1: To create a framework for Acequia Community Restorative Justice

Acequia Community Restorative Justice means that CESOSS will continue to support restoring agriculture and ways of living with the land and the natural cycles. CESOSS will follow the idea of restorative justice as a peacemaking instrument.

Goal 2: To conduct Acequia Conservation and Preservation

Under this goal, CESOSS will create strong partnerships with the community, local farmers, state agencies-schools, and other community partners and collaborators to support water conservation and preservation.

Goal 3: To facilitate Acequia community education

Our education model will closely follow Ciclos de la Tierra as a framework. Our long-term expectation is to increase the acequia knowledge base in the South Valley by maximizing the use of social media, curriculum development, online workshops, and in-site community workshops.

Goal 4: To support Acequia and Community Healing

A fundamental task for CESOSS in terms of youth and community empowerment will be to include healing as a central theme in everything we do. Our healing will come from empowering the community's history, legal rights, cultural connections, and ways of thinking that come from the long history of the communities in the Rio Grande Region. Ceremony will be included in most of our events.

Goal 2: To conduct Acequia Conservation and Preservation

Conduct public outreach and education to promote agricultural land and water conservation efforts to stakeholders in the MRG. Organize, publicize, coordinate, and moderate at least four community workshops per year. The following are the events and activities that CESOSS will coordinate during FY2025-2026.

1. CESOSS will organize at least two water conservation workshops to inform the community about sustainable agricultural practices and water conservation initiatives tied to agricultural lands and water delivery practices for acequias. These workshops will be organized in the Fall of 2025 and Spring 2026.
2. Consult and seek a partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Services, Bernalillo County, and the Water Utility Authority to promote water conservation efforts in the Middle Rio Grande service area.
3. Use CESOSS's publication, La Voz, to promote agricultural land and water conservation efforts. La Voz will be published every quarter of the year. A full section of this publication will be dedicated to conservation programs and initiatives.

To promote a culturally appropriate curriculum that reflects the history, values, and customs of the acequia communities of the Middle Rio Grande Region (Acequia Community Advocacy)

1. Pajarito Landmarks Project: The intent of this project is to highlight the history of the Pajarito Acequia
2. CESOSS Atrisco Research Collaborative: CESOSS created this group serves as the backbone for CESOSS to conduct Research and Learning. This group is composed of community members.
3. Acequia Documentation Project: We are still planning this project. This project will take place in the Summer of 2025
4. Youth Empowerment
 - a. ACE Leadership Program - 2024/2025
 - b. Youth Leadership Institute - Ce Akatl: This Leadership program will take place in the Fall of 2025 and Spring of 2026

A Declaration of Community Stewardship

A Community Call for Science, Law, and Long-Term Stewardship of New Mexico's Waters

Issued by the undersigned acequia commissioners, community organizations, neighborhood associations, farmers, educators, researchers, faith leaders, and residents of the Middle Rio Grande in support of responsible, science-based stewardship of New Mexico waters.

Re: Community request for science-based water administration, respect for law and public welfare, and a temporary moratorium on additional Middle Rio Grande water transfers pending cumulative-impact review

Dear State Engineer Anderson and Director Riseley-White,

Water has always been the foundation of New Mexico's communities. Long before modern water administration, acequias sustained families, agriculture, local economies, and entire communities through a shared ethic of stewardship and mutual responsibility. Today, as New Mexico enters one of the most severe periods of drought and water uncertainty in its recorded history, we believe our responsibility to protect this shared resource has never been greater. It is in that spirit--not confrontation--that we write to you.

We write as acequia commissioners, farmers, neighborhood associations, nonprofit organizations, educators, community leaders, and residents of the Middle Rio Grande. We recognize the difficult responsibility entrusted to the Office of the State Engineer and the Interstate Stream Commission. We also recognize that your agencies have publicly acknowledged the seriousness of current water conditions: persistent drought, extremely challenging Rio Grande conditions, low water deliveries to irrigators, extensive Rio Grande drying, extremely low water levels at Elephant Butte, increasing groundwater dependence, and projections of approximately 25 percent less water in New Mexico streams over the next 50 years.

We take seriously Director Riseley-White's statement that New Mexico's water future must be grounded in science, law, and long-term stewardship. We also take seriously the State Engineer's acknowledgement that New Mexico's river basins have seen below-average precipitation and that reservoir levels are among the lowest on record. These are not abstract concerns. They describe the reality already being lived by acequia communities, farmers, domestic-well users, and families across the Middle Rio Grande.

For that reason, the question before us is larger than a single application. It is whether the State's current administrative practices adequately reflect the scientific realities that your own agencies have publicly acknowledged. When the State warns of declining streamflows, increasing aridification, compact pressures, groundwater stress, and reduced future water supply, then decisions allowing additional transfers from already stressed systems must be evaluated with exceptional care.



We are not asking the State to abandon New Mexico's system of water rights. We are asking that the system be administered in a manner that reflects today's science, today's hydrologic realities, and the State's own commitment to law, conservation, public welfare, and long-term stewardship. A water-rights system that works for all New Mexicans must be transparent, accountable, and resistant to practices that may appear procedurally permissible while undermining the broader public purpose of water administration.

Every generation inherits the responsibility to care for New Mexico's waters. Previous generations built and defended the acequias that still nourish our communities today. Our responsibility is not simply to administer those systems according to procedures established under different conditions. Our responsibility is to ensure that those procedures continue serving the public welfare as scientific understanding evolves and the climate changes around us.

Acequias are not merely irrigation infrastructure. They are living community institutions that protect local food production, aquifer recharge, cultural continuity, mutual aid, and democratic stewardship. When surface water is moved away from communities, the impacts are not limited to a parcel boundary. They may affect shallow groundwater, return flows, soil moisture, domestic wells, wildlife habitat, agricultural viability, and the cultural landscape that has sustained New Mexico for generations.

The current administrative framework may not adequately account for cumulative impacts during an era of unprecedented drought and groundwater uncertainty. As a result, procedures that were developed under different hydrologic conditions deserve careful reexamination to ensure they continue fulfilling their intended public purpose. This is especially important in the Middle Rio Grande, where compact obligations, declining flows, increased pumping, and climate-driven aridification are converging at the same time.

We therefore respectfully call upon the Office of the State Engineer and the Interstate Stream Commission to implement a temporary moratorium--or another appropriate interim policy mechanism--on additional water transfers in the Middle Rio Grande until the cumulative effects of drought, groundwater depletion, climate change, return-flow loss, aquifer recharge reduction, and existing transfers can be fully evaluated using the best available science and consistent with New Mexico law.

At minimum, before additional transfers are approved, the State should ensure that applicants demonstrate, with substantial evidence, that proposed transfers will not impair existing rights, undermine the public welfare, conflict with conservation of water, weaken Rio Grande Compact compliance, diminish groundwater sustainability, or place disproportionate burdens on acequia communities and domestic-well users.

We also respectfully request a public meeting or working session with acequia commissioners, community organizations, local governments, farmers, scientists, MRGCD representatives, and affected residents to discuss how transfer decisions are being evaluated in light of current drought conditions and long-term water projections. Communities that depend on these systems should not be treated as afterthoughts in decisions that may shape their future.

We are not asking the State to choose between agriculture and conservation. We are not asking the State to disregard existing water rights. We are not asking the State to abandon New Mexico's proud tradition of water law. We are asking the State to lead--with science, with transparency, with courage, and with the understanding that the decisions made today will determine whether future generations inherit rivers that still flow, aquifers that still recharge, farms that still produce food, and acequia communities that continue to define the cultural identity of New Mexico.



We stand ready to work collaboratively with your offices, elected officials, water users, researchers, and communities across New Mexico to strengthen a water management system that works for all. Our concern is not only what happens in one proceeding. Our concern is whether New Mexico will meet this moment with the honesty, discipline, and stewardship that our water future requires.

Purpose of this Pilot

This document reframes the Ciclos de la Tierra initiative as a pilot project and collaborative plan of action intended to support exploratory implementation during the 2026–2027 academic year. Rather than presenting the initiative as a fully institutionalized long-term program, this pilot structure allows Valle Vista Elementary and CESOSS to evaluate feasibility, student engagement, curriculum integration, family participation, and long-term partnership potential.

Pilot Project Overview

The Ciclos de la Tierra Pilot Project is designed to test and evaluate culturally grounded outdoor education, acequia stewardship, agricultural learning, and youth leadership programming within the Valle Vista Elementary community. The pilot will focus on developing scalable educational activities that can later expand into a broader school-community educational model.

Why a Pilot Structure Matters

A pilot structure creates flexibility for Valle Vista Elementary and CESOSS to collaboratively evaluate implementation strategies, identify strengths and challenges, refine curriculum approaches, and determine long-term sustainability before full expansion. This framework also allows the school to measure student engagement, educational impact, and family participation in a manageable and supportive way.

Pilot Goals and Objectives

- Test culturally grounded outdoor learning activities
- Pilot youth leadership and environmental stewardship programming
- Develop and refine lesson plans and curriculum materials
- Increase student and family engagement through hands-on educational experiences
- Strengthening collaboration between Valle Vista, CESOSS, and community partners
- Collect data and feedback to guide future program expansion

Pilot Program Components

1. Outdoor Learning Activities: Pilot outdoor learning sessions connected to agriculture, ecology, acequia systems, and environmental stewardship.
2. 5th Grade Leadership Pilot: Small-group leadership activities focused on responsibility, environmental stewardship, and community engagement.
3. Family and Community Events
4. Seasonal pilot events centered around agricultural traditions, gardening, cultural celebrations, and family participation.

7. Pilot after-school programming focused on gardening, agriculture, storytelling, cooking, and environmental education.

- Increased student engagement in outdoor learning

Long-Term Vision

If successful, the Ciclos de la Tierra Pilot Project may serve as the foundation for a broader long-term educational partnership that integrates environmental stewardship, acequia education, agricultural learning, and culturally grounded curriculum into future school programming and community partnerships.

Schools across the state are currently facing challenges related to chronic absenteeism, student disengagement, academic struggles, mental health concerns, teacher burnout, and growing disconnection between students, schools, families, and local communities.

Many students struggle to find meaningful connections between classroom learning and their daily lives, cultural identities, and local environments. The Ciclos de la Tierra Pilot Project seeks to address these challenges through culturally grounded, place-based, and community-centered educational experiences that reconnect students to land, water, agriculture, acequia traditions, and environmental stewardship.

How the Pilot Addresses Current Educational Challenges

1. Student Engagement and Chronic Absenteeism

The pilot creates hands-on educational experiences through outdoor learning, gardening, leadership activities, and community engagement. These experiences help students feel more connected to school and learning.

2. Social-Emotional Wellness and Mental Health

Outdoor learning and cultural activities provide opportunities for emotional regulation, reflection, teamwork, and community connection.

3. Culturally Relevant and Place-Based Education

The pilot integrates acequia traditions, local agriculture, and Indigenous and community knowledge systems into learning experiences.

4. Family and Community Engagement

The project strengthens relationships between schools, families, and community organizations through workshops, events, and collaborative activities.

5. Leadership Development

Students participate in stewardship and leadership activities that build responsibility, confidence, teamwork, and community awareness.

6. Innovative Educational Models

The pilot allows Valle Vista Elementary and CESOSS to collaboratively test educational approaches that combine environmental learning, social-emotional learning, agriculture, and culturally grounded curriculum.

Briefing

Purpose

The Atrisco Memorial Project is a Bernalillo County initiative led by Anthropopolus Design + Planning (ADP). Through a formal subcontract, CESOSS serves as the community engagement, education, and youth leadership partner responsible for ensuring the memorial is shaped by the voices, history, and aspirations of the Atrisco and South Valley communities.

Why CESOSS Was Selected

CESOSS brings deep relationships with acequia associations, neighborhood organizations, schools, youth, and community leaders. Its culturally grounded approach helps ensure the memorial reflects authentic community knowledge while building long-term stewardship.

Major Deliverables

- Conduct up to three community engagement forums.
- Analyze community input and translate it into design recommendations.
- Facilitate up to three community feedback meetings.
- Support design refinement and implementation planning.
- Coordinate participation with Rio Grande High School.
- Organize one Rio Grande High School community forum.
- Lead up to six student design and implementation sessions.
- Provide project management, reporting, and stakeholder coordination.

Project Value

Beyond public participation, CESOSS will help develop youth leadership, document community knowledge, strengthen partnerships, and create a memorial that reflects the cultural identity and resilience of the South Valley. The work integrates education, civic engagement, and collaborative planning into the design process.



Atrisco Acequia Cultural & Economic Dev. Site

Concept Paper

The Atrisco Acequia Cultural & Economic District is a community concept intended to foster conversation among community organizations, public agencies, educational institutions, and other partners about the long-term future of the historic Atrisco Acequia Madre corridor. Rather than representing a finalized development plan or committed project, this concept offers a shared vision that can be explored, refined, and shaped collaboratively over time.

The concept imagines how the Atrisco Acequia Madre landscape near Central Avenue and Sunset Road could evolve into a regional destination that integrates education, agriculture, cultural heritage, environmental stewardship, and community-centered economic development while preserving the area's historic and ecological significance.

Potential elements for future exploration include an Acequia education and research center, outdoor classrooms, demonstration gardens, community gathering spaces, farmers markets, cultural programming, heritage tourism connected to Route 66, and opportunities to strengthen local food systems. These ideas are intended to stimulate discussion about how traditional acequia knowledge and community values might inform innovative approaches to sustainable development.

In addition to its educational and cultural potential, the concept invites partners to explore new models of community-centered economic development. By building upon the area's existing cultural, agricultural, and environmental assets, the partnership could evaluate opportunities to support local entrepreneurs, farmers, heritage tourism, small businesses, workforce development, and regional investment. Rather than viewing economic development as separate from conservation, the concept explores how protecting land, water, and cultural heritage could become the foundation for a resilient local economy that benefits both current and future generations.

The concept also provides a framework for exploring partnerships among CESOSS, the South Valley Regional Association of Acequias (SVRAA), Bernalillo County, the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District, the City of Albuquerque, schools, universities, community organizations, and residents. Through an inclusive planning process, partners can evaluate opportunities, priorities, community needs, funding strategies, and governance models before determining whether and how any future projects should move forward.



Ultimately, this concept invites stakeholders to consider how protecting land, water, history, and community knowledge could contribute to a resilient future for the South Valley. It serves as a starting point for dialogue and collaboration rather than a commitment to a specific development, recognizing that any future direction should be guided by community input, partner participation, and shared decision-making.

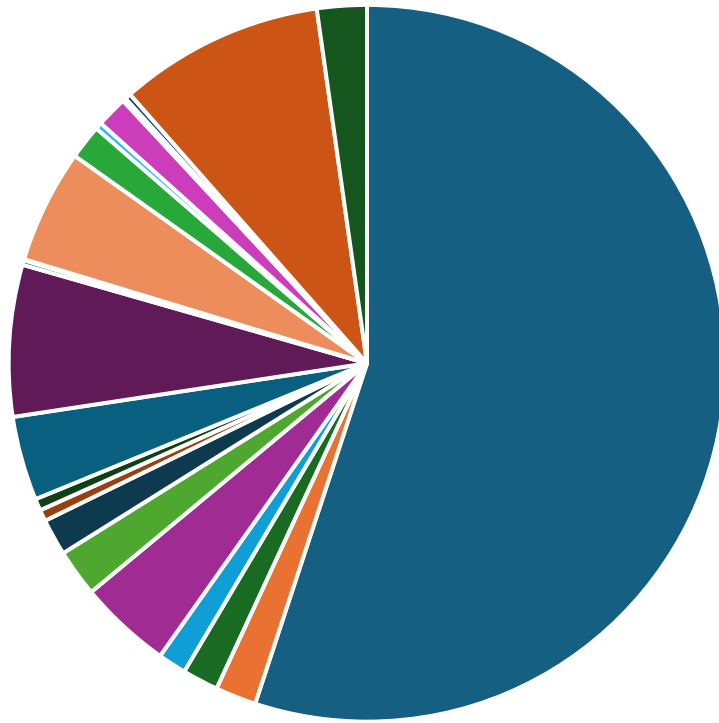

General Fund – Budget to Actual

The District budgeted for a balanced General Fund in FY26.

Budget adjustments were made throughout the year to incorporate unbudgeted items. The total amount of budget adjustments to be pulled from the fund balance was \$2,684,241, consisting of \$1,842,499 for the Belen Highline Rundown, to pay the Isleta Settlement, and for prior year encumbrances of \$841,742.

Revenues (excluding other financing sources ytd through July 9, 2026):

- Actual revenues total \$33,626,230.
- Ad Valorem revenues are trending approximately \$1,724,513 above budget. An additional \$500,000 is anticipated in July.
- Additional revenues above budget include:
 - o Licensing fees: \$649,998 higher than budgeted due to the modified licensing fee schedule.
 - o Interest on investments: \$282,401 higher than budgeted.
 - o Realized and unrealized gains on investments: \$434,315 (not budgeted).

Expenditures (excluding transfers):

- Actual expenditures total \$32,760,915, compared to revised budgeted expenditures of \$37,075,339.
- FY2026 encumbrances total \$3,464,316, bringing total expenditures plus encumbrances to \$36,225,231.

A projected surplus of \$1.9 million is expected for the General Fund, primarily due to revenue surpluses of \$3.1 million, projected expenditure surplus \$600 thousand (including projected expenditures), offset by additional expenditures of \$1.8 million.

Major expenditure categories trending higher than FY2025 include:

- **Salaries and employee benefits:** Increased due to union negotiations.
- **Employee and Board Related Costs:** FY26 was an election year
- **Vehicle & Equipment Maintenance:** Higher costs from increased parts and repairs
- **Governmental Agreements:** Additional agreements were added in FY26; some were offset by additional revenues
- **Capital expenditures:** Secured equipment with a loan, paid for the Belen Highline Rundown #2

Long Term Assets Fund (Levee) – 4Q FY2026 Budget to Actual

Revenues:

- \$42,641 primarily from interest earned on cash with LGIP.

Expenditures:

- Right-of-way purchase for the Albuquerque Levee \$123,000, Additional amount due to USACE for the Bernalillo to Belen Levee Design \$310,000.

Debt Service Fund – 4Q FY2026 Budget to Actual

Revenues:

- \$40,286 from interest earned on cash with NMFA. (need to add June once statements are received)

Expenditures:

- Total debt service expenditures: \$779,335, comprising principal payments of \$683,856 and interest payments of \$95,479.
- Monthly transfers from the Capital Investment Fund totaled \$860,278.

Grant Fund – 4Q FY2026 Budget to Actual

Revenues:

- Year-to-date grant revenues total \$21,836,190. The current negative cash balance reflects billed but not yet received grant funds or grants to be billed once checks have cleared. Fund balance will net to zero once all grants have been billed.
- Loan proceeds total \$461,261 and transfers-in from the Capital Investment Fund total \$862,498.

The District originally budgeted \$27,975,532 in grant revenue/expenditures. Approximately \$8.0 million (Including Transfers) is expected to remain unspent and will be re-budgeted in FY2027, due to delays in the following projects:

- **G3736 Corrales Siphon Grant (\$6,000,000):** Delayed due construction and right-of-way issues.
- **G3745 Socorro Canal Lining Phase 2 (\$500,000):** Extension granted; will bid out phase 3 in FY27.
- **G3752 NFWF Grant (\$600,000):** Delay in signing the grant. Budgeted in FY27.

Expenditures:

- Total \$25,020,090 (excluding other financing sources). A transfer was made to the General Fund for \$34,542 for Indirect Overhead Charges.

Capital Investment Fund – 4Q FY2026 Budget to Actual

Revenues:

- \$4,809,246 including Ad Valorem revenues through June. An additional distribution is expected in July. Actual revenues came in \$400 thousand above budgeted revenues.

Expenditures:

- Total expenditures: \$1,401,482, including:
 - o Equipment: \$784,606.
 - o Projects: Allison Lateral/ New Belen Wasteway \$150,251.
 - o Corrales Siphon Pumping \$367,408
 - o Ad Valorem collection fees: \$99,217.

Transfers:

- \$744,467 to the Debt Service Fund.
- \$2,420,316 to the Grant Fund.

Cash balances for each fund are shown in the Balance Sheet. Unaudited cash balances in the general ledger total \$38,018,034.

Director Russo Baca Board Reports July 2026

Report on Corrales Farmers Co-Op Meeting, June 9, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the Corrales Farmers Co-Op meeting at the invitation of participants she met during MRGCD's Sandoval County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting. Director Russo Baca provided an overview of the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District, including its mission, water management responsibilities, and current irrigation operations, with particular emphasis on MRGCD's conservation programs and opportunities available to agricultural producers. The meeting provided an opportunity to answer questions regarding irrigation operations, water conservation, and the District's ongoing efforts to support agriculture while strengthening relationships with the Corrales farming community.

Report on the VCSWCD Conservation Camp, June 10, 2026

Director Russo Baca participated in the Valencia County Soil and Water Conservation District's annual Conservation Camp, an educational program sponsored in part by the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District that introduces youth to agriculture, conservation, and natural resource stewardship through hands-on learning experiences. Director Russo Baca presented an overview of the MRGCD, discussing the District's mission, irrigation system, and the importance of responsible water management in supporting agriculture throughout the Middle Rio Grande Valley. Drawing on her own experience as a livestock producer, Director Russo Baca also led demonstrations on dairy goat management and milking, providing campers with the opportunity to learn firsthand about animal husbandry and the connection between water, agriculture, and food production. Throughout the day, campers participated in interactive activities focused on livestock, farming, wildlife, soils, and conservation practices. MRGCD's continued sponsorship and participation in the Conservation Camp reflects the District's commitment to agricultural education and inspiring future generations to become responsible stewards of New Mexico's land and water resources.

Report on the 2026 Next Generation Water Summit, June 11-12, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the 2026 Next Generation Water Summit, which brought together water professionals, builders, developers, engineers, researchers, and policymakers to discuss innovative approaches to water conservation and water reuse in the arid Southwest. This year's theme, *Increasing Demand, Declining Realities*, focused on practical solutions to address growing water demands through conservation, reuse, advanced building technologies, and integrated water management. Presentations explored potable and non-potable water reuse, decentralized water systems, green infrastructure, water-efficient development, and policy initiatives intended to improve long-term water resilience. The conference provided valuable insight into emerging technologies and strategies that may inform future water management practices throughout the Middle Rio Grande Valley.

Report on CESOSS' 2026 Acequia Walk and Talk Acequia Madre Headwaters, June 13, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the CESOSS Acequia Walk & Talk as an invited representative of MRGCD. Hosted in partnership with the South Valley Regional Association of Acequias, the Walk & Talk series brings together community members to learn about the history, culture, and continuing importance of the South Valley acequia system. Participants discussed the historical development of the Acequia Madre, current challenges facing traditional irrigation systems, community stewardship, and the importance of protecting acequias as both cultural and agricultural resources. The program included guided discussions along the Acequia Madre Headwaters focusing on the role of acequias in irrigation, community stewardship, native vegetation, and the interconnected relationship between water, agriculture, and the bosque. Participants also engaged in bilingual educational activities designed to introduce families and youth to acequia infrastructure, local wildlife, and the natural features that make up the acequia environment.

Report on the MRGCD's Urban Issues Advisory Committee, June 15, 2026

Director Russo Baca, Vice Chair Baugh, and Director Dunning attended the inaugural meeting of the Urban Issues Advisory Committee. Committee members reviewed the committee's purpose and discussed priorities identified through the public application process. The five primary areas of interest identified by applicants included land use and planning/access policies, education and outreach, wildfire and vegetation management, declining cottonwood and native tree canopy, and legislative matters. The meeting established a framework for future discussions and provided an opportunity for committee members to begin identifying priorities affecting urban constituents within the District.

Report on MRGCD's Valencia County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting, June 18, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended MRGCD's Valencia County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting, which was well attended by local farmers, ranchers, elected officials, and community members. District staff provided updates regarding the 2026 irrigation season, available water supplies, infrastructure maintenance, and current operational conditions. Producers expressed concerns regarding reduced water availability, drought conditions, irrigation scheduling, and the challenges facing agriculture during another dry year. The meeting provided an important opportunity for the District to hear directly from water users, answer questions, and continue strengthening communication with Valencia County agricultural producers.

Report on MRGCD's Socorro County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting, June 24, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended MRGCD's Socorro County Community & Farmers Informational Meeting. District staff presented updates regarding water operations, infrastructure maintenance, irrigation scheduling, and current river conditions affecting the Socorro division. Local producers discussed irrigation challenges, water supply conditions, and maintenance concerns while District staff responded to questions and provided updates on ongoing projects. The meeting continued MRGCD's commitment to maintaining open communication with constituents throughout the service area.

Report on the MRGCD Legislative Committee Meeting, June 29, 2026

Director Russo Baca, Vice Chair Baugh, and Director Dunning attended the MRGCD Legislative Committee meeting with District staff and legislative counsel. Committee members reviewed the New Mexico Legislative interim committee schedule, discussed issues anticipated during the upcoming legislative session, and considered potential legislative priorities affecting the District. Discussions included opportunities to improve water infrastructure, support agricultural water management, and monitor legislation that may impact conservancy districts and water management throughout New Mexico.

Report on NM Water Trust Exploratory Committee Meeting, June 30, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the New Mexico Water Trust Exploratory Committee meeting. Committee members reviewed the draft New Mexico Water Trust Business Plan, including the proposed values statement, discussed a potential WaterSMART Cooperative Watershed Management Program funding opportunity, and considered transitioning the Exploratory Committee into a permanent Advisory Committee. Members also discussed committee membership, organizational structure, and next steps for advancing the New Mexico Water Trust initiative.

Report on MRGCD Field Visit to Sevilleta National Wildlife Refuge, July 1, 2026

Director Russo Baca, Vice Chair Baugh, Director Lopez, and MRGCD Right-of-Way Manager Michael Padilla toured the Sevilleta National Wildlife Refuge with Refuge Manager Jeff Sanchez. The field visit focused on ongoing habitat restoration and water conservation projects within the refuge, including efforts to improve riparian habitat, enhance wildlife resources, and promote efficient water management. The visit provided an opportunity to discuss collaborative conservation approaches and identify areas of mutual interest between MRGCD and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.



Report on the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos Coalition Meeting, July 2, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos Coalition meeting. Jason Casuga, MRGCD Chief Engineer and CEO, provided an overview of current District operations and initiatives. Anne Marken presented an update on current water conditions and operations, while Alicia Lopez, MRGCD's new Director of Technical Services, introduced herself to Coalition members. The meeting continued the ongoing dialogue between the Coalition and MRGCD regarding issues of mutual interest, including water management, intergovernmental coordination, and continued collaboration throughout the Middle Rio Grande Valley.

Report on CESOSS' 2026 Acequia Walk and Talk Arenal Acequia, July 11, 2026

Director Russo Baca attended the CESOSS Acequia Walk & Talk featuring the Arenal Acequia. Hosted in partnership with the South Valley Regional Association of Acequias, the community event explored the history, operation, and cultural significance of the Arenal Acequia and its role within the South Valley irrigation system. Community members discussed the importance of preserving acequia traditions, maintaining irrigation infrastructure, and protecting the agricultural heritage of the Middle Rio Grande Valley. Director Russo Baca participated in discussions on MRGCD operations and answered questions on irrigation management and District programs.
